Mrs. Smith is the younger daughter of William K. Vanderbilt and the late Mrs. Graham Fair Vanderbilt, and is a sister of Mrs. Vanderbilt Phelps, whose two marriages have ended in divorce.

The sisters were reared in the Catholic faith by their mother, who was the daughter of the late United States Senator James G. Fair of San Francisco.

The Vanderbilt-Fair marriage ceremony was performed in 1899 by the Rev. Thomas F. Murphy, an assistant priest at St. Patrick's cathedral in New York. They were divorced in Paris in 1927. Mrs. Vanderbilt died in New York on July 7, 1935, after an illness of two months.

ALGEBRA AIDS IN NABBING THIEVES

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Landon R. Jones, chief operator of the local Western Union office, hopes the price of scrap copper drops soon.

Eager to get their hands on the valuable copper, thieves have been ripping out one high-speed wire after another in South Jersey the past few weeks.

But algebra came to the rescue of Chief Operator Jones last night, and today state police had two men in custody.

Last night someone climbed up a pole along the old abandoned Reading railroad right-of-way and with a pair of pliers snipped a score of wires.

Jones was at the switchboard when everything "faded west." He shot 160 volts of "juice" into each of the disconnected lines, noticed each had a "capacity kick-back" of 10.6 volts, and figured by an algebraic formula that the break was a few hundred feet beyond the Egg harbor railroad station.

He informed the state police at Hamonton, and five miles from their barracks they found a man up a pole.

They arrested Anthony Guglielmo, 35. Another man escaped in a truck. After questioning Guglielmo, troopers went to Landisville and arrested a man booked as Dominic Vessallo, 35, who they said "went out" with Guglielmo last night.
