WOOL

BOSTON, Nov. 28.—The Commercial Bulletin today says:

"The spot wool movement has lessened somewhat this week but prices are stronger than ever.

Contracting in the west has been kept and prices are slightly dearer for the week. Probably not more than 30 million pounds have been placed under contract, of which about half has been taken in Texas.

Mostly, prices paid are between 30 and 35 cents; occasionally a cent more for choice medium or two to three cents less for inferior fine wools.

"The position of the market is so tight that spinners and manufacturers have not infrequently withdrawn lines for the present. This is also true to a notable degree in Bradford.

"Foreign markets are very strong, especially the primary markets.

"Mohair is higher, the country having been practically cleared on the basis of 60 cents for adult hair in Texas."

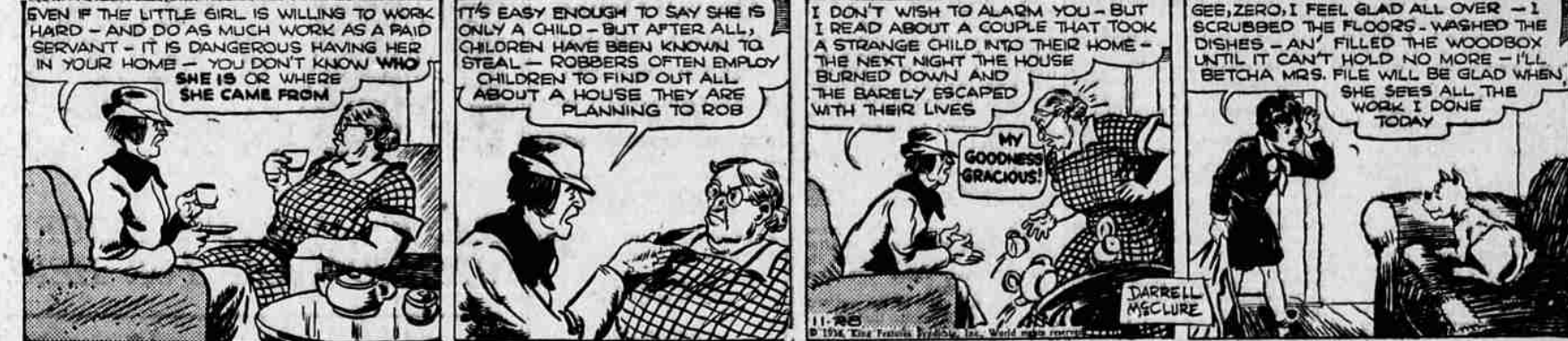
