OREGON TAXPAYERS' BURDEN DECREASED

SALEM, Nov. 30.—(AP)—The state tax commission handed Oregon property taxpayers an early Christmas present today.

The commission said that property owners will be asked for \$1,032,323 in 1937—more than \$1,000,000 less than they paid in this year and the greatest relief afforded the mwth the exception of 1932, when the levy was waived.

Increases in revenue from income taxes, which must be applied to reduction of the property levy, will be the principal factor in lowering the tax despite the growing financial burdens of the state because of capitol reconstruction, old age assistance and the like.

The commission has eliminated the entire property tax within the six per cent constitutional limitation and the levy to be collected will be applied to the support of the higher education and payment of irrigation district bond interest.

Officials estimated that revenue would be sufficient to restore salaries of state employees besides meeting operating costs and keeping the state in the black after it had pulled out of the red this year for the first time since 1926.

EXAM FOR HOOPSTER OFFICIALS DATED

Clyde H. Beard, principal of Roseburg senior high school, has been appointed as an examiner for the Oregon high school athletic association, and will direct tests for basketball officials at Roseburg Saturday. Examinations are being conducted simultaneously in 56 cities Saturday. Persons desiring to officiate in high school basketball games will be required to take the examination and register with the state association.
