DESIRE FOR BIGGER CAPITOL REMAINS

Legislative Action Depends on Other Demands, Says Senator Strayer.

BAKER, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Senator W. H. Strayer, Baker county democrat, said possible legislative action to expand Oregon's still unconstructed state capitol would depend upon other demands for funds when the lawmakers meet at Salem next month.

"A lot of things may drain away our money," said the senator. He commented on reports the legislature would be asked to provide money for a state library.

"There is talk about reducing the old age assistance law limit from 70 to 65 years. Also, the members will have a lot of bills calling for appropriations." The veteran senator expressed some dissatisfaction with capitol plans. He said:

"My idea was to push commercialism back from the capitol grounds. Purchases of the three blocks to the north would have made a wonderful setting and would have provided land for the future. It would have been mighty good business."

The present quarters of the state library were called a "disgrace" by Representative A. S. Grant.

"I am sure the house of representatives wanted a building for the library when it was considering the capitol at the special session a year ago," he said.
