MONOPOLIES AGAIN TARGET OF BORAH

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Aiming a new weapon at his old target, monopoly, Senator Borah of Idaho has proposed federal charters for corporations doing business across state lines.

The corporations would not be permitted to do business without such charters and to retain them, concerns would have to avoid "monopolistic" practices.

Similar in form to a federal incorporation law proposed by Senator O'Mahoney, Wyoming democrat, Borah's plan differed in aims. O'Mahoney intends primarily to set up uniform wage and labor standards for interstate corporations.

"The chief object of my bill," said Borah, "will be to prevent the monopolistic practices now carried on by corporations under the vast powers granted by state charters."

Meeting the press soon after his return to the capital, the Idaho republican followed his new anti-monopoly plan with a long discussion of supreme court decisions and constitutional amendments.

A constitutional amendment to give the federal government power over wages and working conditions, he said, would "open the door to giving the federal government all the things now reserved to the police power of the state."

This would mean revision of the whole dual national-state system of government, he said.

Commenting on other issues, Borah said:

On a social security program: "Absolutely essential to our civilization." Although he opposed amending the constitution, he said that if the social security law is invalidated by the supreme court, an amendment would have to be "seriously considered."

On reciprocal trade agreements: "If they would lower the tariff all along the line on manufactured goods as well as on farm products, I would have no objection whatever."

REDSKINS, PACKERS FACE TITLE CLASH

CHECAGO, Dec. 7.—(AP)—The Boston Redskins, who will be after their first title, and the Green Bay Packers, who dominated the field from 1929 through 1931, will fight it out next Sunday for the national professional football league championship.

Boston won the eastern division honors yesterday, whipping the New York Giants 14 to 0 in the mud and rain at the Polo grounds in New York. In ending the Giants' four-year reign as eastern titleholders, Boston wound up its schedule with seven wins and five defeats.

Green Bay, which clinched the western title a week ago, finished the season with a scoreless tie against the Chicago Cardinals. The Packers' record for the campaign: 10 wins, one defeat—by the Chicago Bears—and the Cardinal tie.

The title clash will be played either in New York or Boston. Detroit, 1935 title winner, ended its season by defeating Brooklyn 14 to 6.

GONZAGA DEFEATS COUGARS, 13 TO 6

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 7.—(AP)—The Gonzaga Bulldogs held the edge in their grid duel with Washington State Cougars again today. They won Saturday 13 to 6—their third consecutive victory over the cougars.

Ed Goddard, star Washington State quarterback, flipped a touchdown pass in the third period for the first score of the game. A W. S. C. fumble led to the tying score four minutes later but in the final frame a pass again gave the Bulldogs 6 points.

Goddard was kept tied up most of the game while Karamatic and Owen, Gonzaga backs, stole the limelight.

ABBOTT SIGNED TO MANAGE INDIANS

SEATTLE, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Sponsor Abbott, who has won 10 baseball pennants in his 27 years as a minor league manager, was the hope today of William H. Klopfer, president of the Seattle baseball club of the Pacific Coast league, to win the title for the Indians in 1937. Abbott is a former manager of the Portland Beavers.

Abbott, who signed a one-year contract over the week-end, succeeds Walter "Dutch" Ruether, former major league southpaw, who resigned this fall.
