

OREGON MINERAL OUTPUT INCREASES

First Honors Go to Baker County; Douglas Yields Only Minor Amount.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—(AP)—The bureau of mines reported today a final summary showed gold, silver, copper and lead produced from Oregon ores in 1935, in terms of recovered metals, was valued at \$2,010,345, compared with \$1,216,075 for those metals and zinc produced in 1934.

No 1935 zinc production was reported. The bureau said large increases in both quantity and value were recorded for gold, silver, copper and lead.

"An appreciable quantity of placer gold produced by itinerant miners and prospectors has been included in the total 1935 gold output of the state," the bureau said.

The value of the Baker county output was more than twice that of any other county, but Grant, Josephine and Jackson county were "important producers," the bureau said.

The bureau's 1935 production figures showed: Gold, lode and placer, 54,160.11 fine ounces valued at \$1,895,694; silver, lode and placer, 110,385 fine ounces valued at \$79,329; copper, 397,500 pounds valued at \$33,917; lead, 59,575 pounds valued at \$7,283.

The 1935 production of those metals amounted to \$3,711.59 fine ounces of gold, lode and placer, valued at \$1,178,220; silver, lode and placer, 46,560 fine ounces valued at \$30,999; copper, 38,273 pounds; lead, 41,603 pounds, and zinc, 73,184 pounds.

No values were reported for the 1934 copper, lead and zinc production.

One treated in 1935 amounted to 184,543 short tons, compared with 62,145 in 1934. Of the 110,385 ounces of silver produced in 1935, 106,419 ounces were from lode mines, 3,975 ounces from placers.

Other counties that produced minor amounts were Coos, Curry, Linn, Douglas, Harney, Jefferson, Malheur, Marion, Umatilla, Union, Wheeler.
