STRIKE CUTS YULE TRADE IN ORIENT

SHANGHAI, Dec. 8.—(AP)—America's Christmas trade with the orient, normally a large one, was at a virtual standstill today, a result of the continuing ship strike in the United States.

Because of tied-up cargoes in American ports, manufacturers said they had been forced to seek materials from other sources.

Importers, both here and at Hong Kong, were facing huge losses, they declared, and some have suspended business.

Toy dealers said Santa Claus would suffer a blow because of their inability to obtain certain types of toys, especially dolls which have been bought in the United States until now.

Motion picture theaters, relying almost entirely on Hollywood for their programs, are facing a film shortage.

Prices of a variety of American imports here have risen from 10 to 25 per cent since United States ships stopped flying across the Pacific. Foodstuffs were especially high.

Manufacturers estimate \$215,000,000 of Christmas toys will be sold in the United States in 1936 as compared to \$200,000,000 in 1935.

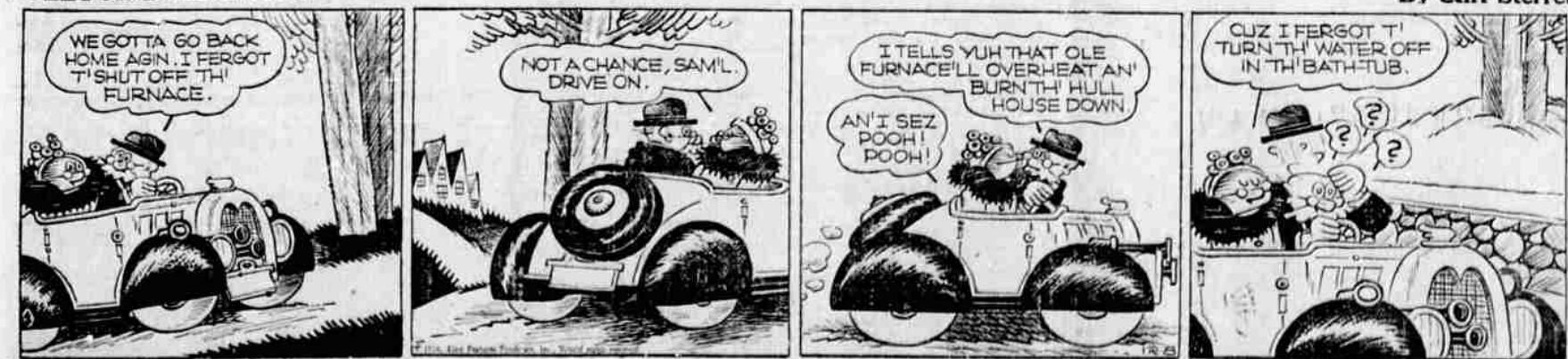
