2. Cream cheese and chopped

stuffed olives.

3. Cream cheese and chopped

nuts.

4. Ground boiled ham and chop-

ped pickles or chopped peanuts.

5. Green pepper, pimento and

olives with mayonnaise.

6. Boston brown bread with

minced corned beef seasoned with

mustard and rubbed to a paste.

7. Cottage cheese and pickles,

olives, nuts or pimentos.

8. Tuna fish mixed with parsley,

lemon juice, seasoning and a bit

of onion.

9. Chopped stuffed olives and

chopped nuts, moistened with sal-

ad dressing.

10. Pimentos, cucumbers and

onion or chives, minced, mixed

with mayonnaise and spread on

buttered entire-wheat bread.

Use dark or wholewheat bread.

Put through meat chopper equal

quantities of white and sweet

pickles. Moistened with French's

cream mustard salad dressing

ITALIAN WINNER OF NOBEL PRIZE PASSES

ROME, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Luigi Pirandello, 69, famed Italian playwright and winner of the 1934 Nobel prize for literature, died today.

The author of "Six Characters in Search of an Author" died of pneumonia after a brief illness.

Pirandello left instructions in his will that he should receive the humblest sort of a funeral. He directed that his death should not be announced immediately, that there be no flowers for his funeral and that no mourners follow his casket to the grave.

Shortly after birth she was separated from her sister, to whom she was linked by a fibrous cord at the abdomen.
