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CONGRESSMEN HIT TOWNSEND PLAN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(AP)—A majority of the congressmen assigned to delve into Dr. F. E. Townsend's organization, reported today that under his old age pension plan "ten per cent of the people would receive half the national income from the labor of the other ninety per cent."

The plan, they said, "would bring chaos" to the country. Declaring that "at least a million dollars" was collected by the organization, the committee majority said:

Most of the key men were making large profits out of it, together with receiving their living expenses "on a lavish scale."

While the majority said Dr. Townsend, himself got between \$52,000 and \$53,000 from the organization, Rep. Tolson (D., Calif.), contended the pension leader was "sincere and honest" and "never intended and actually did not profit personally from the Townsend movement."

Rep. Collins (R., Calif.), joined with Tolson in dissenting from the majority report. Collins said tersely he disagreed with the others "conclusions and opinions."

"I've congressmen signed the majority report, led by Chairman Bell (D., Mo.) Rep. Hoffman signed no report.

The committee's report came less than a week after Dr. Townsend and two aides—the Rev. Clinton Wunder of New York and John B. Kiefer of Chicago—were indicted by a federal grand jury here for defying the house during the investigation.

ALSEA CLOSING TO NETTING DEMANDED
ALBANY, Dec. 10.—Members of the Santiam Fish and Game Protective association voted at their annual meeting Tuesday night to join Benton county sportsmen in an effort to have the Alsea river closed entirely to commercial fishing.

Action followed a plea by P. O. Urban, Dr. R. M. Peffer and H. M. Cummings, Corvallis, who declared that the commercial value of fish taken from the Alsea is negligible in comparison with the value of that stream as a tourist-sportsman attraction.

ELLIOTT ROOSEVELT GETS COLLEGE JOB
AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 10.—(AP)—Governor Allred announced today he would appoint Elliott Roosevelt, son of the president, a member of the board of directors of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college. The appointment will be effective in January.

ROOSEVELT LIBEL CHARGED TO EDITOR
SAN JOSE, Calif., Dec. 10.—(AP)—Charged with libeling President Roosevelt, P. Milton Smith, 68, Mountain View weekly newspaper publisher, was arrested today and posted \$2,000 bail bond with Justice J. M. Atkinson, Mountain View, pending his arraignment before Justice Grandin H. Miller here Monday afternoon.

The libel charged was preferred by Horace E. Beales, president of the Mountain View Patriotic league.

Beales claimed Smith inferred President Roosevelt was a "charlatan, faker, and hypocrite" in an editorial published Nov. 27.
