GRADE CROSSINGS RULES TO BE DRAWN

SALEM, Dec. 11.—(AP)—Frank C. McCulloch, public utilities commissioner, called a hearing December 18 at his office, to consider final adoption of new rules for the protection of railroad grade crossings throughout the state and rendering reports on accidents.

McCulloch said the hearing will be attended by representatives of all rail carriers of the state, some of the transcontinental roads being represented by their chief engineers and signal engineers.

Modern protective measures, to be put into effect the first of the year, are incorporated in the new rules, McCulloch said.

VISITOR DISCUSSES POULTRY PROBLEMS

A discussion of poultry problems and a description of the incubation process was heard yesterday by the Roseburg Rotary club. The talk was presented by H. A. Bittenbender, vice-president of the Backeye Incubator company of Springfield, Illinois.

The money received by poultrymen comes one third from the sale of meat and two thirds from the sale of eggs, the speaker said. The poultry industry, he pointed out, is an enormous one grossing more than one billion dollars annually.

Mr. Bittenbender, here for the turkey show at Oakland, also discussed the marketing problems of the turkey industry. Although government figures recently issued show a large increase in turkeys this year, the speaker voiced the opinion that these figures do not accurately reflect the condition of the market. The drought in the middle west forced vastly greater marketing of meat than formerly giving rise to a storage surplus which has had a depressing effect upon the market, he said.

The greatest problem of the turkey industry, the speaker said, is to stimulate consumption of turkey meat throughout the year instead of concentrating the consumption at holiday time.

Don Radabaugh, program chairman, announced the annual Christmas meeting of the club for next Thursday evening. This meeting will be a 7:30 dinner to be attended by Rotarians and their ladies and guests.
