PEAR CONSERVE

MRS. GIL OSBORNE, Roseburg. 12 pears, cut in small dice; 1 qt. can crushed pineapple; 2 oranges, grated rind and juice; ¼ cup sugar; 1 cup fruit. Let this stand for several hours and then cook with moderate heat until the consistency of marmalade. Just before removing from fire add one 20c bottle marmalade cherries which have been cut fine, also the juice. Seal in sterilized glass jars. Makes approximately 5 pints. This conserve is improved by age. So don't eat too soon after making.

MRS. E. A. HELMBOLDT

Roseburg, Ore. 8 lbs. pears, 8 lbs. sugar, 3 lemons, grated rind, add juice, 2 oranges, run rind of one through food chopper, ¼ lb. ginger root, or 1 tsp. Jamaica ginger extract. Cook until thick, add 2 cups of walnuts if desired, the last thing before sealing.

CANNED STRING BEANS

MRS. HARRY J. BROWN, Roseburg, Ore. MRS. CURTIS McCALL, Wilbur, Ore. MRS. L. H. CORNISH, Roseburg, Ore. String and break 2 quarts string beans. Add ¼ cup vinegar, 1 tablespoon sugar and 1 tablespoon salt. Put in kettle and cover with plenty of cold water. Bring to boil and boil 20 minutes. Fill jar well with beans, then fill jar with fresh boiling water and seal. To use, rinse well in two waters. Season and cook as you would fresh beans.

CANNED CORN

MRS. FRANCIS DANIELS, Roseburg, Ore. Place prepared corn in a sack, dip in boiling water five or ten minutes to set milk. Cut from cob. Pack loose in sterilized jars. Fill jar with cold water, put on lids, place in boiler of cold water and boil 4 hours. Remove, and tighten lids.
