VON ELM REGAINS LAURELS AT GOLF

GLENDALE, Calif., Dec. 21.—(AP)—George Von Elm, once the master golfer of the country, came back into championship glory today with the reacquisition of the southern California open cup.
Von Elm, looking little older than the day 10 years ago when he beat the great Bobby Jones for the national amateur crown, stroked his way through 72 holes of sub-par golf for a total score of 69-68-70-72—279. Par at the Oakmont Country club is 72—and 288 for 72 holes.
The Hollywood pro pocketed \$400 for first prize. He won the southern California open title as an amateur in 1925.
Harry Bessler, Long Beach, Calif., professional, came from behind and edged out Olin Dutra of Los Angeles for second place money of \$150, shooting a 68 on the final 18 holes yesterday for 287.
Dutra missed a pair of putts of less than a yard. They cost him \$100 and he took a 283 to win third place's \$150.

CAHILL IMPROVED. SHOOTER UNCAUGHT

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 21.—(AP)—Attendants said today William C. Cahill, Oregon state champion hunter who was shot at his home here last week, was considerably improved. His father, W. A. Cahill, arrived here from San Francisco.
Officers still were without clues to the whereabouts of 14-year-old Clyde Ellis, sought in connection with the shooting. Cahill was shot after ramrodding with Ellis for handling the latter's mother.

TURKEY MARKET REGARDED "GOOD"

PORTLAND, Dec. 21.—(AP)—The current turkey market was described in trading circles here today as "very good," with prices for selected birds a trifle better.
Buyers were offering 15 cents generally for toms and 18 cents for No. 1 hens, but hens were quoted as high as 19 cents. The selling price for toms ranged around 19 to 20 cents and 20 to 21 cents for hens, with some selections up to 22.
A decrease of receipts and an increase of demand was apparent.

APPLE SHIPMENTS SHOW INCREASE

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—(AP)—Shipment of apples from Oregon and Washington in 1936 is considerably ahead of last year's mark, a survey shows.
Loadings for three northwest states, with first figures indicating those of 1935 and the latter figures 1936, were: Oregon 1,201, 2,084; Washington 12,795, 15,393; Idaho 3,984, 1,959.
Shipments for all three states up to Dec. 11 totalled 19,436 cars, compared with 17,877 a year ago.
C. J. Hansen, of the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics, said apple shipments throughout the United States had increased 15 per cent over a year ago. Prices were described as steady, as were those for pears.

Shirley Temple Begins Her Fourth Year As Contract Actress; Still Foremost Of Film World's Box-Office Attractions

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Dec. 21.—(AP)—Shirley Temple, the million-dollar baby, began her fourth year Dec. 19 as a contract actress. She is not yet eight years old.
Three years ago, Dec. 19, 1933, she was an unknown little girl, working on a week-to-week basis in a series of one-reel baby pictures. On that day she came with some 149 other children—most of whom also had dimples and curls—to try out for a brief song-and-dance bit in the musical film "Stand Up and Cheer."
Today she is the No. 1 box-office attraction of the motion picture world.
Her box-office stature is twice that of Garbo. Executives of 20th Century-Fox studios estimate that 240,000,000 people—a number twice the size of the population of the United States—have paid to see her on the screen.
And, they claim, the scope of her popularity is still growing. They cite the lukewarm reception she used to receive in Paris, and compare it to a very recent situation in the French capital, when her pictures were playing in five different theaters the same day, and all to capacity audiences.
The superlatives go even further.

TOMATOES LOSE VITAMIN ON SHELF

Canned tomatoes and tomato juice are two of the readily available sources of vitamin C, but it has recently been determined by investigators of the bureau of home economics of the United States department of agriculture that after being canned by approved home methods and stored the tomatoes lose some of their vitamin C value.
In fact, they may lose from 21 to 65 per cent, depending on whether they are canned in glass or tin and on how long they are stored.
The vitamin C substance in foods is ascorbic acid. The vitamin C potency of tomatoes and tomato juice was measured until recently by the biological method, with ascorbic acid. These tests require a long period of time to make and are being replaced by the rapid chemical test for ascorbic acid.
Since home-canned tomatoes are so commonly used as a source of vitamin C, the bureau of home economics undertook a 6-months' study to learn by chemical analysis the effect of home canning and storage on the ascorbic acid originally present in the fresh tomatoes.
Results of the experiment show that both home canning and storage have a significant destructive effect on ascorbic acid. When whole tomatoes and tomato juice were canned in tin, they suffered about equal losses of ascorbic acid during both canning and storage.
When canned in glass, the juice lost more of its ascorbic acid than the whole tomatoes.

GORE CASE MAY GO TO JURORS TODAY

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 21.—(AP)—Official arguments in the suit of William H. Gore against Jackson county for \$88,000, purportedly due for services rendered in behalf of the Oregon-California land grant tax refund bill, were under way in circuit court this morning.
The court was expected to start giving instructions to the jury at the opening of the afternoon session, and to require two hours to do it.
The case is expected to be in the hands of the jury late this afternoon.
M. M. Warren of Pasco City, Neb., turned her 610-acre farm which this year produced 17,000 bushels of wheat into grass for next year to save it from erosion.

HIGHER STANDARD OF RURAL LIFE URGED

CORVALLIS, Dec. 21.—(AP)—A program of increased effort toward bringing the standard of rural life in America to the best level attained in urban localities was advocated by Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter in an address before a final session of the annual conference of agricultural and home economics workers at Oregon State college.
"The first essential in raising the rural life standard, of course, is the application of science to rural production and marketing problems such as is now being carried on effectively through the experiment station and county agent system," Dr. Hunter said.
"The field of rural sociology, however, has lagged in development in comparison with rural economics. Improvement of rural schools through consolidation and other means also was urged as necessary in improving the cultural level of agricultural regions on which he said in the end the entire nation's welfare rests.
Dr. Hunter spoke highly of the program now being carried on in a limited way and urged its expansion as rapidly as funds will permit.
On the same program, Dr. C. W. Peavy, president of the college, urged much the same objectives through attention to conservation of both natural and human resources.
The work of the extension and experiment station forces, he said, is making possible shorter labor hours and making a national contribution to culture.
