SELL PRIVILEGE TO HUNT, FARMER TOLD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—(AP)—The government called on the farmer today to come out from behind his "no hunting signs" and make profitable peace with visiting sportsmen.

"The farmer," said Col. H. P. Sheldon of the bureau of biological survey, "should have no more hesitation in putting a cash price on his pheasants, quail and rabbits than he does on his wheat, poultry and butter."

The government has issued a neat little booklet instructing the agriculturist on the fine points of collecting fees.

To begin with, the farmer is warned against accepting candy for the wife and kiddies and a cigar for himself in return for allowing the city slickers to run the place with guns.

"It is far more satisfactory for all parties," says the booklet, "to have it understood that farm game is a cash crop to be paid for by the purchaser (fig. 13)."

Figure 13 shows a man dressed in overalls and a weather-beaten hat having his right palm filled with crisp currency by two jovial sportsmen whose arms are laden with game and fowling pieces.

The government suggests that neighboring land owners get together and work out a system. This has been done in several states.

Backers of the game-management plan pictured a day when the hunter will knock on the farmhouse door, present a coupon and go off happily into the fields.

"With the farmer doing his part," explained Col. Sheldon, "every intelligent sportsman in the country will welcome the arrangement."
