PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 1.—(AP)—Santa Barbara won the grand sweepstakes prize in the Tournament of Roses parade today.

Santa Barbara's lavish entry depicted Omar Khayyam and "Thou" in the style of the famous Persian poem.

In the business class, the Standard Oil company won the grand prize with a "standard symphony" float showing a Louis XIV garden in sweet peas, orchids and lilies of the valley.

Long Beach won the theme prize of the tournament with a float showing "the June bride" in white robe and veil surrounded by tallis-man roses.

COMMISSIONER OF IMMIGRATION DIES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Col. Daniel W. MacCormack, 57, commissioner of immigration and naturalization, died today of peritonitis. He underwent an operation two weeks ago.

MacCormack left the presidency of the Fiduciary Trust company of New York to accept the immigration post in 1933. He reorganized the work to combine the immigration and naturalization agencies into one service.

MacCormack was with the American forces in the Philippine insurrection, and from 1905 to 1917 was an executive in the Panama canal organization.

After the World war, in which he was a captain, he served on a peace conference mission to Russia.

UTAH AND ARIZONA FIGHT HEAVY SNOW

Highways Blocked, Power Lines Disrupted, Towns Left in Darkness.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Winter laid a heavy hand on Utah today.

Three foot drifts blocked the Salt Lake City-California highway between St. George and Cedar City, in southwestern Utah.

Power lines snapped under the weight of snow, leaving St. George and other towns lightless, except for improvised old fashioned types.

The state road commission rushed snow-fighting equipment into clogged districts.

Snowslides in central Utah Spanish Fork canyon limited traffic to one-way caravans.

Snow depths ranged from a few inches to two feet in the valleys. The mountains were covered with a white mantle three to five feet deep.

And still snow fell.

Fifty automobiles were stalled between St. George and Cedar City. Road crews transported the passengers to nearby towns.

KIDNAPED BOY NOT YET RETURNED HOME

was an amateur rather than a "big time" gangster. No professional kidnaper would ask a ransom as low as \$28,000, he pointed out, and no seasoned criminal would take

the chance of seizing the boy before witnesses as this man did. William and Muriel Mattson, and Virginia Chatfield all were present when Charles was seized and all three have asserted they could identify the kidnaper.

An amateur, the official reasoned, would be much more likely to harm his captive than a professional would be, simply because he might not understand the severe punishment attached to such an act.

Father Pessimistic

A second official, refusing to comment on the eventual outcome of the search, predicted the boy would not be returned in less than 48 hours no matter how well negotiations progressed.

Like most of those giving information on the Mattson search, both these men refused to allow use of their names.

Dr. W. A. Mattson himself injected one pessimistic note into the search when he denied having had any word from his son.

Asked, "have you had any direct word from Charles?" he answered: "No, nothing. No, there's not a thing."

All these discouraging statements came in the face of persistent reports the Mattson family has established contact with the kidnaper.
