GRAHAM CRACKER ICE CREAM

MRS. E. S. PRUNER, Riddle.
1 c crushed graham crackers; 1/2 c sugar; 2 c coffee cream; 1 c vanilla. Combine cracker crumbs, sugar and cream, add vanilla and pour into refrigerator tray and partially freeze. When quite solid but not hard, remove to a chilled bowl and beat with a rotary beater until light and fluffy. Return to tray and finish freezing. Makes 1 quart.

TUTTI FRUTTI TRIFLE

MRS. EDNA VAUGHN, Roseburg.
1/2 grapefruit; 1/2 c pineapple; 1/2 orange; 1 c moist coconut; 6 marshmallows; 6 maraschino cherries; 2 T maraschino juice; 3 egg whites; 5 T powdered sugar. Cut grapefruit and orange in halves and remove sections, then cut in pieces. Cut pineapple into small pieces and cut marshmallows into eighths. Soak marshmallows and coconut in combined juices. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold in sugar. Drain maraschino mixture, combine with fruits and fold in egg whites. Turn into refrigerator tray. Serves 6 or 8. For a beautiful color effect, serve this in green glasses or on green plates.

MY FAVORITE PUDDING SAUCE

Brookway, Ore.
1 cup white sugar (or brown for caramel sauce)
2 heaping T. butter
1 cup boiling water
1 T. cornstarch
Cream butter and sugar. Mix cornstarch with a little cold water, then stir into boiling water. Pour this over butter and sugar. Add flavoring. Especially good with plum or any fruit pudding.

THREE IN ONE SHERBET

MRS. J. WEBSTER CARLSON

Glendale, Ore.
3 oranges; 3 lemons; 3 bananas; 3 c sugar; 3 c water; 3 egg whites; few grains salt.
Dissolve sugar and salt in boiling water. Cook. Put juice of oranges and lemons through strainer. Make pulp of bananas and put through strainer. Mix with syrup, add lemon and freeze 12 to 24 hours. Add stiffly beaten egg whites and freeze until stiff. Turn freezer slow at first and faster at last.

LEMON CREAM SHERBET

AUGUSTA WILSON, Riddle.

1 pt. milk; 1 c sugar; grated rind of 1 lemon; 1/2 pt. cream; juice 2 lemons; 2 egg whites; 2 T. sugar.
Add sugar to milk and allow to dissolve. When thoroughly dissolved add lemon rind and juice. Stir while adding lemon juice. Turn into freezer tray and freeze 45 min. to 1 hr. Beat egg whites, adding the 2 T. sugar. Whip the cream to a thick custard consistency. Combine with the beaten egg whites. Add frozen mixture and mix lightly. Return to freezing unit and freeze 2 to 2 1/2 hrs. (Requires no stirring.) Serve garnished with sprig of mint.

HOMEMADE ICE CREAM

1 Gallon (Freezer Method)

CORA COLLISON, Roseburg.
MRS. DONAL GIBBS, Roseburg.
6 eggs; 1 1/2 c sugar; 2 T vanilla; 1 qt milk; 1 qt thin or whipping cream. Beat eggs thoroughly, add sugar and beat well. Then add vanilla. Add milk and cream and beat well and put in gallon freezer can. Pack with salt and ice and freeze. Serve plain or with chocolate or pineapple dip.
Variation: Use 4 eggs and 1 qt of thin cream. Makes right amount for 3 qt freezer.
