C. E. Starbuck of Myrtle Creek won the prize offered by the Douglas County Farm Bureau Cooperative exchange for the oldest tractor still in use in Douglas county.

His entry was Fordson No. 77371, purchased in 1917 from W. A. Burr. T. B. Busenbark of Melrose reported a John Deere plow purchased in 1904, and Roy Hatfield of South Deer creek was winner of the prize for the greatest number of John Deere implements on his farm.

C. E. Banning, manager of the exchange, reports the largest crowd of farmers and their families ever present at any show of this kind given by the exchange. Moving pictures, lectures and cutaway parts showing and explaining John Deere and Caterpillar tractors and implements were given, and lunch was served to three hundred guests by the wives of the exhibitors.

Mr. Banning reports a great deal of interest shown in the newer types of equipment, especially in the new Diesel motors and extra heavy plows being built for the more powerful tractors now on the market.
