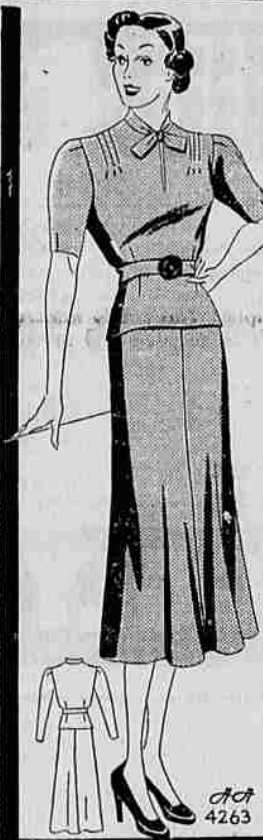
CATHOLIC PUBLIC CARD PARTY IS ANNOUNCED FOR FRIDAY, JANUARY 22

The afternoon will be spent by each person attending drawing her living room to scale and placing the furniture as it is now arranged and then planning new arrangements.

FAVORITE RECIPES

SHERBET
DOROTHY HERMANN, Roseburg.
Small can apricots; small can peaches; small can crushed pineapple. Crush together, then add: 1 c sugar; 1/2 pt whipping cream. Whip cream, then mix together. Put into tray to freeze. Stir occasionally.

PHILADELPHIA ICE CREAM
MRS. LEONA SLACK, Sutherlin.
2 t gelatin; 1/4 c cold water; 1/2 c (2 c) scalded milk; 1 c sugar; 1/2 c (2 c) cream (1 use 1 can Oregon condensed milk) chilled; 1 T vanilla.
1. Soak gelatin in cold water about 5 min. and dissolve in scalded milk. Add sugar and when sugar is dissolved, cool and add milk and vanilla. 2. Put into tray of chilling unit and freeze to mush. 3. Remove from refrigerator, whip until creamy and return to chilling unit to freeze. This makes a very nice ice cream and never fails as it does in the "heat" of your cream first and then add it to the milk as most recipes call for.

ICE CREAM
MRS. R. O. GOFF, Sutherlin.
7 eggs; 2 heaping c sugar; 2 T (heaping) corn starch; pinch salt. Add egg yolks to 2 of whole milk and beat while cold. Warm and add sugar and salt. Steam thoroughly and add corn starch (cook until quite thick). Remove from fire and fold in beaten egg whites. Before freezing add 1 pt cream and flavoring. Makes 1 gallon.

JUNKET WHIP ICE CREAM
MRS. MILO E. TAYLOR, Roseburg.
3/4 c whole milk (warm); 1/4 c sugar; 1 t each vanilla and lemon extract; 1/4 t salt; 1 Junket tablet added to the warm milk. Mix above and place at once into refrigerator pan. Let set until mixture has congealed then place in freezing unit. Let it freeze to mushy consistency or until about half is frozen. Remove, place in mixing bowl and beat well with rotary or electric beater. A little cream may be added. Replace in freezing unit, lower control to usual temperature. This can be used in freezer. This is excellent for children, also for dessert after a meal as it is not rich but is very creamy and fluffy when well beaten.

TUTTI-FRUTTI ICE CREAM
MRS. A. W. BASHFORD, Roseburg, Ore.
MRS. WALTER SINGLETON, Roseburg, Ore.
1 c milk; 20 marshmallows; 1/4 pt whipping cream; 1 can shredded pineapple (well drained); 1/4 c cut up candied cherries; 1 c chopped walnuts; 1 t vanilla. Heat milk in double boiler and dissolve in it the marshmallows. Allow to cool. Whip cream, add cooled marshmallow mixture and beat together well; add fruit and nuts, beating all thoroughly before placing in freezing tray.
Variation: For chocolate ice cream use 1/4 c chocolate in place of fruit. Proceed as above.

DATE STICKS
MRS. THERON HALL, Drain.
MRS. H. B. LEHMAN, Roseburg.
1 cup sugar
1 t shortening
2 eggs
1 T. hot water
1 cup flour
1 t baking powder
1/2 cup cut nut meats
1 cup dates, cut fine
Mix sugar, shortening and well beaten eggs. Since there is so little shortening I like to use oil as it is easier to measure. Then add hot water and flour that has been sifted with baking powder. It will be quite stiff but that will be all right. Save 2 T. flour to mix with chopped dates, so the pieces are separated and will not stick together when dates and nuts have been added to the stiff dough. Spread thinly in an oiled pan about 10 in. sq. (of course the pan may be other shape). Bake in a very moderate oven set at 325° 25 min. Let cool, then cut sheet of cakes in strips.

WOOL

BOSTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The market for wool is stronger this week both here and abroad. Average fine wools are up a cent or so in the last week and medium wools are also against the buyer. In the foreign primary markets there is rather more advance, in consequence of the buying furor of the Japanese and Australia, South America and South Africa. Yorkshire has advanced Merino top prices 1/2 to 2 pence per pound.

"In this market, secured wools have been especially strong, owing to the government request for bids on CCC cloths in large quantity.

"The piecegoods market is healthy and moderately active, although rather reluctant to pay the higher asking prices.

"A little scattered contracting is reported through the west at firm prices.

"Mohair is exceedingly strong but not very active at the moment."
