ASTORIA, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Henry Jakkala didn't like license No. 13 for his big German Shepherd dog and he told the county clerk so when he put it around the dog's neck. A short time later, the dog became ill and died.

CAESARIAN BABY'S DAD HELD SLAYER

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 8.—(AP)—Police prepared to prosecute "Baby" Randall's father for murder today while medical science, which saved the infant at five-and-a-half death's crossroads, gave him "every chance" to survive.

Dr. Clarence Du Puy, who delivered the baby boy through a Caesarian operation just before the mother died from a bullet wound, said the infant was "entirely normal."

Assistant District Attorney Charles Wehr announced a murder charge will be brought against 21-year-old Horatio "Ray" Randall, despite his denial he shot his wife and her aunt Thursday night.

The aunt, Miss Amelia Hohnhaus, 65, remained in a critical condition, with bullets lodged in her head and neck.

Randall's 19-year-old bride of five months, the former Elsie Hohnhaus of Fort Wayne, Ind., died a few minutes after Dr. Du Puy saved the unborn child.

Police inspectors asserted a check of Randall's story that he was at an aviation field at the time of the shooting had "blown it sky high."

The wounded aunt reiterated, the officers said, her charge that Randall shot both his wife and her.
