

COACH ASKS THRICE TOP TEACHER'S PAY

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 19.—(AP)—Nebraska's builder of football champions, Dan X. Bible, moved to the University of Texas today—and so did a report that he wants three times as much as the highest paid professor here to become coach of the Longhorns.

Bible, it was understood, is asking \$15,000 annually for a five to ten-year contract or \$25,000 annually for himself and assistants. The university president, Dr. H. V. Benedict who is paid \$8,000 a year, is known to oppose both a high salary and a long time contract.

The top professor salary is \$5,000.

Bible—his tricky, lateral minded Cornhuskers at the University of Nebraska are almost perennial winners of the Big Six conference title—accepted an invitation of the board of regents to confer here today regarding the post vacated by the former Notre Dame star, Jack Chevigny.

H. J. L. Stark, millionaire godfather of the University of Texas, favors a big time mentor here to restore prestige here on the gridiron. Bible meets his specifications.

Two men were recommended to the board by its athletic committee. The other was not identified. Bible's 1929-1936 record at Nebraska shows 50 victories, seven ties and 15 losses.

BASKET BALL SCORES AND GOSSIP

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 19.—(AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team, somewhat recuperated from its grueling 35 to 34 victory over Oregon State, headed toward Pullman today for its third battle with the second-place Washington State Cougars.

Honors are even between the teams at present, each winning one in the two-game series here last week. The fourth game tomorrow night will be the last of the season for the Webfoot-Cougar rivalry.

Four other northern division games will be played this week as the hoop season hits its stride—Oregon vs. Idaho at Moscow Friday and Saturday nights and Oregon State vs. Washington at Seattle the same two evenings.

On Oregon's showing on its current road trip will depend to a considerable extent its final standing. Only two other out-of-state conference games face the Webfoots—with Washington at Seattle March 6 and 8.

RIDDLE HIGH QUINT DEFEATS CAVEMEN

The Riddle high school Irish scored an impressive win over the Grants Pass 'Cavemen' by a score of 26 to 10 in a basketball game at Riddle Saturday night.

JOE HUMPHREY'S MEMORY HONORED

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Somewhere along the Broadway of the great beyond, Joe Humphreys must be swelling with pride today.

The friends he left behind him, great and insignificant as human values go, last night paid the late fight announcer with the silvery voice a tribute seldom equalled for sincerity and admiration.

At Madison Square garden the shuffling parade of fight champions, 2,000 persons assembled. Their spokesmen, led by Postmaster General James A. Farley and former Mayor Jimmy Walker, paid simple but impressive tribute to Joe's memory.

Former Mayor Walker, making his second public address since his retirement from politics, received a tumultuous reception as toastmaster.

"I'm one of those, perhaps, who has a great future behind him," said Walker, "but one human unit in that future I shall never forget—Joe Humphreys. I never heard him become the detractor of any man. Joe Humphreys left knocking

to others and insisted on boosting, even if he had to boost to empty seats....

"I propose a toast: 'To the winner—and still champion, Joe Humphreys.'"

Farley, long a close friend of Humphreys, also paid glowing tribute to his memory as a friend and pal.

Receipts of the dinner, estimated at close to \$1,000, will be used to erect a bronze plaque to Humphreys' memory at Madison Square garden and a shaft over his grave.

MAX'S BOSS SAYS BOYCOTT FIZZLING

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Joe Jacobs, American manager of Max Schmelling, insisted the German heavyweight would appear in New York next month to start a nation-wide exhibition tour before his fight with Champion Jimmy Braddock, and Joe Louis was in town to start training for his bout with Bob Pastor at Madison Square garden a week from Friday.

These were the principal developments of a rather busy day in the boxing trade.

In reverse order, Louis, arriving yesterday, said he expects to knock out Pastor—so does everyone else—but he wouldn't name the round. He weighs 200 pounds, he said, about five over his fighting weight, thinks he'll have no trouble taking off the surplus in ten days' training at Pompton Lakes, N. J.

Jacobs predicted the collapse of the threatened boycott of the Schmelling-Braddock bout and said the fight would go on as scheduled June 3 with the crowd probably bigger than if there had been no boycott threat.

"I don't mind telling you the boycott had me scared," said Joe, "but the worm has turned over. Even a lot of my Jewish friends have come to me and said the boycott was all wrong. All kinds of letters from all over the country have been pouring in, too, with offers to buy and sell tickets."

PAPOOSES TO PLAY OAKLAND B QUINT

The Roseburg Junior high school Papooses will undergo their second basketball test Thursday night when they meet the B team of Oakland high school at the Junior high gymnasium here, starting at 7:30 o'clock.

Last week the Juniors made a good start by defeating Glendale team 34 to 13. The team in that game showed strong defensive ability, but was somewhat ragged on offense. Coach Hod Turner reports, and efforts to correct mistakes are now being made.

Turner reports he has 12 players, all of about equal ability. He used 10 in last Saturday night's game, making substitutions with no apparent weakening of strength. Marshall Pengra, KRRR commercial manager and Associated Oil company sportsman, will officiate Thursday. He called Saturday's game and his work was entirely satisfactory. Coach Turner said. Pengra officiated for several seasons in the Salem district, where he formerly resided.

Fans attending Thursday night's game will be entertained by the Junior high pep band and by the newly organized girls' drill team, which made its first public appearance last week.

The drill team includes 40 girls, under the coaching of Carol Hollingsworth, physical education instructor, and Thelma Smith of the home economics department. The girls plan new stunts for each home game of the year.

DIXIE PAYS TRIBUTE TO ROBERT E. LEE

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 19.—(AP)—The south paid its annual tribute today to the memory of Robert E. Lee—warrior, statesman and educator—on the 150th anniversary of his birth.

Schools were closed in Virginia, where the son of "Lighthorse Harry" Lee, Revolutionary war figure and governor, was born on January 19, 1776. In some state capitals official business was suspended.

Bank holidays and special school programs were ordered in Florida, Georgia, Arkansas, Kentucky, Tennessee and the Carolinas in memory of the man who led the Confederacy in war and spent his last years as an educator.

Lee died Oct. 12, 1870. He is buried at Lexington, Va., in the chapel of Washington and Lee university, which he served for five years as president.

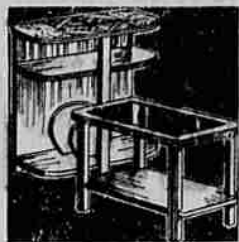

Some 22,000 needy California children under the age of 16 received assistance amounting to \$24,489.22 in November, the state department of social welfare reports.

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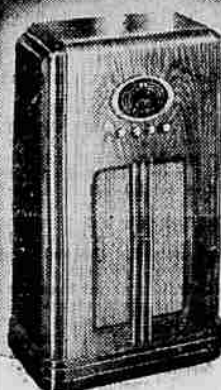
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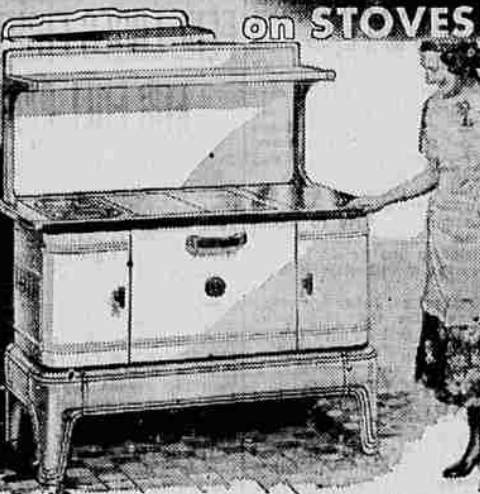
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
