

### WOMAN DIES IN HORRIBLE MANNER

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 21.—(AP)—Beaten by an attacker, comely Mrs. Anita Botelho, 21, was found in a creek near Mills college today and died enroute to a hospital. Ice covered the victim's hair and torn clothing.

Mrs. Botelho, who had been severely beaten, lay half-submerged in the small creek.

James S. Williams, 42, an Oakland garage owner, walked into the police station and informed officers he had been with Mrs. Botelho until 2:45 a. m. today.

Inspector Lou Jewell said Williams informed him that they had been drinking and riding near where Mrs. Botelho later was found, before she left the automobile to return to her home.

Williams was quoted by Jewell as declaring he knew nothing of what happened to Mrs. Botelho after she left him.

An autopsy report disclosed Mrs. Botelho had been criminally attacked. She is survived by her parents and two sisters and two brothers.

Williams told Inspector Jewell that his wife and four children live in the Hawaiian Islands.

### FARM CREDIT UNIT IN PORTLAND SHUT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Outstanding loans of the regional agricultural credit corporation office at Portland, Ore., have been reduced to such an extent the office no longer is needed, the farm credit administration said today in ordering the Portland headquarters close February 16.

The work will be taken over by the Boise, Idaho, office.

Regional offices of the agricultural credit corporation have been in liquidation since May 1, 1934. The PCA said only 80 loans made from the Portland branch remain uncollected.

### PRISONER'S MONEY AROUSES SUSPICION

EUGENE, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Discovery of \$250 in currency in the possession of Carl Westphal, prisoner in the county jail, late Wednesday, coupled with statements made by the man, led county officials here to believe the prisoner and the money might be connected with a kidnaping case or some other crime.

Westphal was arrested by a special officer of the Southern Pacific a few nights ago on charges of stealing a ride. Tuesday night, officers said, he began to exhibit signs of insanity. Late Wednesday he was examined before Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth and was committed to the state insane asylum.

Following his commitment and while playing a game of cards with another prisoner, officers said Westphal took the money out of a wallet in his pocket and throwing it upon a table declared "This is blood money; they're going to hang me so you might just as well have it."

The other prisoners turned the money over to Sheriff C. A. Swartz, who discovered that the currency consisted of small bills numbered almost consecutively. This led officers to suspect it might be part of a ransom payment.

Numbers of the bills were wired to the department of justice in Washington and Sheriff Swartz was in Salem today to interview a FBI man on the matter.

LABOR SECRETARY CALLS AUTO STRIKE CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Secretary Perkins called Governor Murphy of Michigan and leaders of striking automobile workers to her office today. She conferred at length yesterday with the high command of the General Motors corporation.

John J. Lewis, head of the committee for industrial organization, and Homer Martin, president of the United Automobile Workers, were summoned. Murphy was asked to attend.

Miss Perkins, seeking peace in the widespread automobile labor conflict, said occupation of Fisher Body plants was the "principal barrier" to resumption of negotiations between the General Motors corporation and the United Automobile workers.

### HEART ON OUTSIDE OF INFANT'S BODY

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 21.—(AP)—An infant girl, born with its heart on the outside of the body, is a patient at St. Louis Children's hospital. Physicians did not believe the baby would live.

The heart, uncovered by tissue, lies on the center of the chest with its base connected to the larger blood vessels. The beating is plainly visible. Possibilities of an operation to place the heart inside the chest were considered remote at the hospital.

An entirely exposed organ was said by the physicians to be a phenomenon.

valley regions, the damper air made the cold equally unbearable. Medford had 6 above, Grants Pass 11, Roseburg 16, Portland 18 and Salem 17.

Six hundred cases of influenza, many of them mild, existed at Baker, although the official report gave the county only 45. Schools had about 300 empty desks. The Klamath county physician said the disease had declined to about 100 cases. Officially, however, Klamath county did not report a single case.

Nearly 400 of the 1945 students at La Grande are absent, the school office said. The city physician estimated influenza cases between 200 and 500. Many children remained away from school because they have difficulty in breaking through the heavy snow.

An officer of the Oregon Humane society saw hundreds of birds dead of cold and starvation along the highways in northwestern Oregon. The society is spreading food from its regular service cars.

### FEDERAL PRISONS DIRECTOR RESIGNS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Attorney General Cummings announced today the resignation of Sanford Bates, director of the federal bureau of prisons, effective February 1.

Bates, widely known criminologist who has directed the federal prison bureau since 1930, will become executive director of the Hovey Club of America, Inc.

He will be succeeded as director by his assistant, James V. Bennett, who has been in the bureau since 1925.

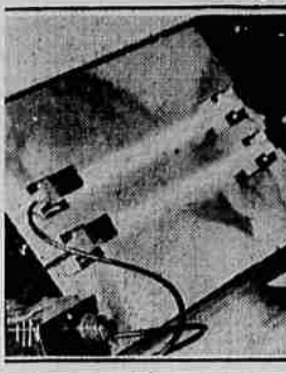

escaped into the woods.

"I made Hammond stop," Benoit was quoted as confessing. "Then I got out and put one of the handcuffs on his wrists. When I tried to get him out of the car he put up a fight and we rolled over on the ground. I could see he was getting the best of me. Then I fired during the scuffle and he got limp. I cuffed his hands around the post (of the mail box)."

Benoit, bleeding profusely from cuts on his head, insisted to officers, however, that he did not realize he had shot Hammond until the officer's body went limp and he succeeded in shackling him to the post.

After leaving the body, Benoit said the pain in the police car brought realization that a highway blockade had been set up which he could not have penetrated. He said he heard orders sending all available Michigan officers into the area, with reinforcements from Ohio and Indiana.

After a brief burst of gunfire from county and state officers, Benoit said, he abandoned the patrol car and fled on foot across a field. Later he took refuge in a barn to escape a freezing rain, Benoit said, and remained until darkness fell last night.
