MADRID AIR FLEET ASSAULTS REBELS

Heavy Loss Inflicted, Says Government; Land Force Also Victorious.

MADRID, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Socialist air bombers concentrated terrific assaults on insurgent positions around Madrid today, attacking fascist encampments five times in dawn raids.

Reverberations from the explosive of heavy bombs echoed through the city as squadrons of government planes sought to destroy insurgent positions west and south of the city.

Socialist infantrymen, driving against fascists in besieged University City, captured the hill of La Sombriella (the Paraso) dominating the northwestern battle zone.

Civilian residents, meanwhile, again were warned to evacuate the capital within the 72-hour period set yesterday afternoon by the emergency defense junta. Refusal to comply with the order would mean forcible eviction from the city, socialist commanders declared.

The defense troops planted the republican flag on the crest of "La Sombriella" after hours of bitter fighting.

The besieging army, the war ministry declared, suffered heavy punishment from high explosives fired by the city's army, which over their front lines, on the western outskirts of the city.

The evacuation warning, issued by the defense junta's committee, advised the populace its effect must be obeyed by tomorrow or "those not doing this will be taken from their homes by designated authorities."

RODEOS' FAITHFUL NURSE TO RETIRE

Woman Who Has Attended 1,700 Cowboys Has Never Seen Bucking Show.

DENVER, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Mrs. Dola M. Tafford, nurse who estimates she has "patched up" 1,700 cowboys but has never seen a rodeo, is retiring.

"I've actually turned in my resignation," she said today as she sat in the little emergency first aid station near the arena where bronco riders were performing in the National Western Livestock show and rodeo.

"Cowboys are the best patients I ever had; they're so appreciative," she explained. She has served at the show for 17 years. "The one who's brought in here injured never thinks he's hurt. His pals all think he's killed."

"They're very loyal to each other."

Her most difficult job, she added, smiling, "is trying to convince one of the boys he should go to a hospital."

"About a hundred performers come in here every year at some time or other during the show," she estimated. "It may be just a scratch they want cleaned, or it may be a broken fracture. My patients include society horse show riders, too."

"Once," Mrs. Tafford said reflectively, "I prevented a murder. I just went right out and took a gun away from a cowboy when he was on the warpath. Every time he sees me, he thanks me for it."

Another time a cowboy who was out of his head hit me on the jaw when he was trying to get out of bed and go back to the show. I managed to call a policeman who helped me hold him until the ambulance came. When he came to himself he was the most remorseful person I ever saw."

About her retirement: "It's high time I was quitting. After all, I'm a grandmother."

She has been in the rodeo arena only once in the 17 years—several seasons ago when she went to call

a physician to attend a badly injured youth.

But she's going in again before she quits, swears Homer Holcomb, the rodeo clown and a veteran of the tanbark.

"I'm going to present her to the crowd at the finals myself and tell the folks what all she's done for the boys," Homer asserted.

THREAT WRITER GETS TERM OF 25 YEARS

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22.—(AP)—A diminutive news vendor, David Harris, 47, was sentenced yesterday to 25 years in federal prison on his confession of writing letters threatening to harm Freddie Bartholomew and Jane Withers, child film stars.

United States Judge Yorkwick imposed a ten-year term for a letter demanding \$25,000 from the Bartholomew family, and separate ten-year and five-year terms for two letters to Jane Withers' mother, asking \$5,000.

STRIKE INCREASES RELIEF PROBLEM

Oregon Must Provide Food and Shelter Minus Aid From Washington.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Means of feeding needy families involved in the maritime tie-up presented a knotty problem to relief and labor officials today following receipt of word from Washington that no additional federal funds would be forthcoming.

A dispatch from the Oregonian's Washington correspondent quoting federal officials as saying the providing of food and shelter was up to individual states brought a comment from Ben T. Osborne, executive secretary of the Oregon Federation of Labor, that, "I feel that anybody who is hungry should be fed."

He said the Oregon delegation in congress and WPA Administrator Harry Hopkins had been urged to provide funds and that "evidently Washington and California put through ample relief budgets and are able to assist, when needed."

The Oregonian's correspondent said Representative Walter Pierce (D., Ore.), received a telegram saying: "A thousand strikers on the Pacific coast must go on relief, but relief funds of Oregon are exhausted."

Osborne said "the only support that strikers have had in Oregon has been from organized labor and what funds they had themselves."

In regard to comments that Washington and California received federal funds for direct relief, Paul D. Ross, Multnomah county relief administrator, said Oregon received its last such grant in November, 1935, and that he did not know whether other states obtained money later.

He said needy strikers who apply for aid are certified for WPA employment and that "we are trying to keep signed right up to our quota on work projects."

James W. Albright, assistant to the state relief administrator, said the state WPA has a waiting list of 1,500, half in Portland.

S. UMPQUA GRANGE ENJOYS PROGRAM

At the regular meeting of the South Umpqua Grange Monday evening Mr. and Mrs. Perry DeVoe and Dan Taylor received the obligation of the first and second degrees.

The question of rodent control was referred to the agricultural committee for consideration.

Favorable consideration was given a resolution presented by Glide Grange wherein the county court was asked to appropriate money from the emergency fund to assist in the control of noxious weeds within the county.

The question of the grange participation in the cooperative gas supply station was considered and rejected for the time being.

Members were asked to notify all new settlers of the new settlers' school to be held in Roseburg on January 25.

The master, J. A. Rhoads, urged that the local grange cooperate with the extension service in 4-H club work, especially in the selection of club leaders for this community.

At the next regular meeting, to be held February 1, the initiatory work will be given for the third and fourth degrees. All officers and members are urged to be present.

Following the lecturer's hour, a lunch was served by the Home Economics club.

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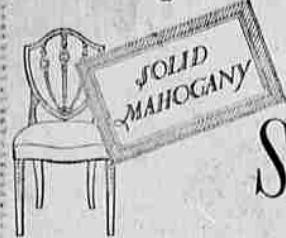
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
