Roseburg Junior High Five

Excelling in every department of the game, the basketball squad from Medford Junior high swamped Roseburg Junior high players in the first half and coasted through the final session to win 24 to 12, after the eighth quarter from Medford in the opening game won from Roseburg eighth grade 15 to 6 in a double header played here last night.

Neither of the General Motors' two plants, the DeLeo-Remy and the Guide Lamp, operated today because of the regular Saturday holiday.

Several Wounded

Firearms, stones, clubs, hatchets and pieces of iron pipe were used in the melee, police said. It started suddenly at a south side tavern, frequented by non-union workers, who have opposed the moves of the United Automobile Workers of America at the DeLeo-Remy and Guide Lamp plants.

Forest Vost of Flint, Mich., who identified himself as a CIO organizer and a man who wouldn't give his name was the most severely wounded. Vost suffered leg wounds. The other man was wounded in the back.

Harold Reed of Anderson and Christian Fox of Milledgeville, Ind., were the only other wounded whose names police obtained.

Police placed the wounded men and nine others under arrest on vagrancy charges.

Reuther hailed the arrival of the troops as a "signal victory" for the union forces.

"We have been attacked ruthlessly and brutally numerous times," he said, "and still the local officials remained indifferent. It is regrettable that men had to be shot before the state recognized conditions weren't so peaceful as the mayor had said they were."

Victor Reuther, a union spokesman, called Anderson City officials "incompetent" and said they had "ignored the rights of organized labor."

During the recent automobile workers' strike, the General Motors' Guide Lamp plant was closed because of a "sit-down" protest. Company officials said the DeLeo-Remy plants had shut down last month because of labor trouble in other parts of the country.

The union in this city of approximately 40,000 residents is in the minority. More than 11,000 persons are employed at the General Motors plants. The union claims a membership of "more than 1,000," non-unionists say less than 1,000 persons are affiliated with the Automobile Workers.

"It amounts essentially to abolishing the supreme court as it has existed since the foundation of the republic, and the setting up of a new tribunal in its stead with reference to a particular situation and with reference to a particular situation which has recently been of may in the near future be pending before the court."

Clark, former house parliamentarian and a co-founder of the American Legion, said "I would be the last to believe the supreme court is sacrosanct or above criticism."

"But the conclusion is inescapable that to increase the court at one time by the increase of an additional two-thirds of its present membership is to pack the court with reference to a particular situation and particular litigation."

The Missouriian called Mr. Roosevelt the "unhappy leader of the American people," but added:

"We cannot assume that so high minded and idealistic executive will always occupy the White House."

Moley, former assistant secretary of state but now a magazine editor, also declared in a radio address that a constitutional amendment was the proper method to seek a change, which he termed necessary.

"But to say that such a need exists," he said, "is not to condone the proposal of a measure which violates the spirit of the constitution itself."

The president's supporters, however, represented him as believing an amendment was too slow a process.

How soon congress would begin formal debate on Mr. Roosevelt's program remained uncertain. The house judiciary committee may take up his recommendations next Tuesday.

Some observers interpreted Mr. M. Landon's declaration in New York that "this grave matter" should be treated without partisanship as indicative of republican policy to avoid making the program a party issue.

consideration," he declared. "I believe we should have studied the bill and argued it because it will go to the people by the initiative route and the public would have learned something about the proposal."

The executive memorial to congress favoring the Townsend plan for pension also did not answer today. The resolutions committee, however, announced an unfavorable report on the recommendation already passed by the house.

The bill to ban chains of women in tobacco advertising likewise was defeated.

House Passes Two Bills

The lower house passed the

measure which would provide for the creation of county planning boards. The declared purpose of the boards would be to promote and encourage the development and conservation of the resources of the various counties.

Another bill which passed the house would reduce the tax on bulk wines, purportedly to encourage bottling in this state, and would put the taxing of bottled wines on a gallon basis of 30 cents per gallon.

Unexpected opposition to the measure authorizing the state highway commission to construct a new office building "when and if they see fit" sprang up on the floor of the house carrying the measure to defeat by a 32-25 vote.

A move to reconsider the action was slated for the afternoon session. Seeing that the vote was against the bill Representative Fuhrer, Marion, changed his vote to the prevailing side, which qualified him to move for reconsideration. It was understood that amendments to the bill, taking out objectionable features, would be made.

Gaming Devices Hit

Legislative sentiment crystallized against slot machines, pin ball games, and like equipment during the past week. In the senate, Carney's bill directed against such equipment was passed over an adverse committee report.

The house committee on health and public morals sent out a "do pass" report on a measure which would confiscate and destroy all such games and the house revision of laws committee turned down a measure which would legalize slot machines and gambling devices by placing a tax upon them for old age aid and school purposes.

Letal Gas Approved

The bill which would provide for the use of lethal gas in executing the death penalty in Oregon received favorable action in the hands of the house revision of laws committee.

Some question was raised to the clause which would allow the warden to set the exact date of the execution during some week designated by the sentencing judge.

Bill Gets New Chance

The house reconsidered its action of yesterday and sent the bill authorizing the state highway commission to build a new office when it sees fit back to committee for amendments.

During the day the house defeated the bill on the grounds that no limit to the price of the building was set and that the measure gave the commission mandatory powers. Representative Fuhrer, Marion, moved for reconsideration and promised that the objections to the bill would be met by amendment when it reaches the committee again.

State Tax Bill Revived

Senator Stricker of Linn introduced the perennial chain store tax measure in the legislature today.

The bill would provide a tax of \$1 on single stores, and \$2 on the second with a graduated scale up to \$250 for each chain store over 75.

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RHS BASKETEERS DOWN NORTH BEND

Surprise Victory Over Loop Leaders Due to Changed Indian Tactics.

The Roseburg Senior High school Indians last night sprung the surprise victory of the season, upsetting the league leading North Bend Bulldogs 17 to 12 in a basketball game played at North Bend.

The Indians, who in past games have used an exceptionally fast style of play, changed last night to a slow, deliberate offense, succeeding in pulling the North Bend zone defense out of position and enabling the Roseburg ball handlers to work the ball into scoring distance by short snappy passes.

The lead changed frequently during the first half, and North Bend held a 10-9 lead midway in the third quarter. The Indians, however, then took the lead and were never headed during the remainder of the contest.

All of the Roseburg players made a good showing, while Sussick was the outstanding player for the Bulldogs.

The surprise victory over North Bend, together with the new style developed by the Indians, is arousing much interest in tonight's game to be played at the senior high school gymnasium, when Roseburg meets the strong Grants Pass team. Tonight's game will start at 8 o'clock.
