**5 KILLED, 300 HURT IN PARISIAN RIOT**

PARIS, March 17.—(AP)—France's popular front government was threatened both by strikes and political difficulties today as the outgrowth of night-long rioting in the workers' suburb of Cligny in which five persons were killed and at least 300 wounded.

The bloody struggle between communists, mobile guards and rightists brought a one-hour strike of workers at the grounds of the forthcoming Paris International exposition, at the Hotchkiss motor plant and in several clothing stores in protest against the deaths and arrests of communists, allied with other left political parties in the government.

Two hundred workers in the La Vallette construction plant in Saint Ouen, outside Paris, started a sit-down, and workers in the whole so-called "red ring" of industrial suburbs were discussing a possible general walkout tomorrow.

Members of parliament filed notices of interpellations of socialist Premier Leon Blum's administration for its handling of the riots, the most sanguinary in Paris in three years.

Strong cordons of police were thrown about strategic government centers to guard against rising political agitation.

Communists, enraged by what they called the "massacre of Cligny," demanded immediate arrest of Col. Francis de la Rocque, leader of the militant right, and dissolution of his French social party, a meeting of which led to the communist demonstration and the riots last night.
