EUGENE'S TITULAR PROSPECTS STRONG

Victory Over Astoria Five Impressive; North Bend Loses to Lincoln.

SALEM, March 18 — (AP) — Eight basketball teams, two of them members of the "B" school division, moved into the second round of the championship flight in the Oregon interscholastic tournament at Willamette university today.

Results of yesterday's openers dropped eight teams into the consolation round. By the end of play tonight only four teams will remain to continue into the semifinals of the title round.

Tournament railbirds viewed Eugene high school as real championship prospects following a dazzling 39 to 24 triumph over Astoria. The valley combination sent the fishermen, famed for their tournament championships, down to one of their worst defeats in many years of Salem competition. Eugene outclassed the coastal school all the way, and the game with Franklin, Portland title holder, tonight should go far in determining the 1937 honors.

Franklin advanced into the quarter finals by nipping Milwaukie, 33 to 24. Franklin trailed 13 to 11 in a first half that was tied up five times. The game was deadlocked three times in the second half before the Portlanders nosed through to victory.

North Bend Beaten. Lincoln, the Portland runner-up, posted an easy 37 to 17 triumph over southwestern Oregon's entry, North Bend. Lincoln led 21 to 10 at the close of the half and the Coos Bay combination didn't hit the basket again until the closing three minutes.

Chiloquin and Bellfountain meet today to determine the "B" championship. The team from the Klamath Indian reservation gained the second round by upsetting Athena 25 to 15. Al Gilles topped the Chiloquin scorers with 14 points in the second half, making a total of 15. The Klamath club led 8 to 6 going into the third period, Bellfountain, one of the top teams a year ago, smothered Amity 43 to 15. The winners at one time led 29 to 3.

Ashland Beats Pelicans. Ashland had little difficulty in eliminating the Klamath Falls Pelicans, 44 to 27. The team coached by Ernest O'Donnell, ex-Oregon State star, came one from behind a 19 to 16 handicap at the end of the half. Ashland began hitting the basket after leading 23 to 22 at the end of the third period.

McLoughlin high school of Milton-Freewater, long a power in state football, extended its supremacy to basketball with a 29 to 26 victory over La Grande. A closing rush by the Tigers nearly turned their defeat into a triumph. Lilly sparked a La Grande rally in the closing period as his team scored 10 points against only four for

Mac H. McLoughlin led 19 to 11 at the half. Salem high school, the host team, stepped into the darkhorse class by stopping McMinnville 34 to 25. The Vikings were in front 15 to 11 at the half but repeated rallies by the McMinnville sharpshooters made the contest a battle right to the close.

DENVER, March 18 — (AP) — Chances of a major surprise were virtually wiped out as eight crack teams pounded into the quarter-final stretch of the national A. A. U. basketball tournament.
