REBEKAH LODGE HOLDS SPECIAL MEETING

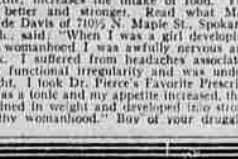

On the cash markets the pressure was far worse than in futures although little cash wheat is being offered at the source.
