MRS. HARRY HATFIELD 2 eggs 1 pint sour milk 1/4 teaspoon soda 1 1/2 cups bran 1 1/2 cups flour 1 tablespoon sugar 1 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons baking powder 2 tablespoons melted shortening

CORN MEAL MUFFIN

MRS. E. T. OGLE, Roseburg. MRS. MILDRED MELINDA, Roseburg, Ore. 1 1/2 cups sifted flour 4 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons sugar 3/4 cup yellow or white cornmeal 1 egg, well beaten 1 1/2 cups milk 3 tablespoons melted shortening Sift and measure the flour. Re-sift with the baking powder, salt and sugar.

FLUFFY BISCUITS

MRS. ROBERT HIBBS, Dillard. DOROTHY HERMAN, Roseburg. 1 1/2 cups flour 1/2 cup corn starch 2 teaspoons baking powder 3/4 teaspoon salt 4 tablespoons shortening 1/2 cup milk and 1 egg if desired. Mix and sift ingredients and rub the shortening in well, then add milk. Turn out on board and roll out about 1 inch thick. Cut out with a biscuit cutter and bake in a hot oven about 425° F. 10 to 15 minutes.

DUTCH CAKE

MARY F. MATTHEWS, Roseburg, Ore. Dissolve one cake of Fleischman's yeast in one cup lukewarm water 5 min. Add 2 cups of flour and enough lukewarm water to make a good stiff sponge. Let rise twice its height. Then mix with two quarts sifted flour. Add about 1 pint milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon cloves, grated rind of lemon and orange, 2 cups sugar, 1 tablespoon salt, 2 cups raisins and the water in which they were scalded. Let rise double its size. Put in pans, let rise and bake.

FLUFFY BISCUITS

MRS. ROBERT HIBBS, Dillard. DOROTHY HERMAN, Roseburg. 1 1/2 cups flour 1/2 cup corn starch 2 teaspoons baking powder 3/4 teaspoon salt 4 tablespoons shortening 1/2 cup milk and 1 egg if desired. Mix and sift ingredients and rub the shortening in well, then add milk. Turn out on board and roll out about 1 inch thick.
