OREGON'S POLICE SCHOOL DRAWS 242

EUGENE, April 5.—(AP)—Warren C. Hyde, director, said that 242 officers had enrolled for the police training classes in 11 Oregon cities, sponsored by the University of Oregon bureau of municipal research, league of Oregon cities, university law school and the federal bureau of investigation.

The program has the personal approval of J. Edgar Hoover, director of the federal bureau of investigation.

County and state law enforcement officers are registered for the classes as well as local police.

HIGHWAY LOAD LIMITS RESTORED

SALISBURY, April 5.—(AP)—The state highway commission announced today full load limits for hauling over most of the state's main highways, which previously had been limited to 50 per cent of the maximum, had been restored.

The limits were lifted on the Ashland-Lakeview highway; the Dufur-Bonanza highway; the Oregon-Washington highway; the Burns-Crane highway; the Walla-Walla-Lakeview highway; Baker to Hope; the Payette spur; the Sherman highway; the Dalles-California highway; the Klamath Falls-Weed highway; the Pacific highway; the Oregon Coast highway; and the Redwood highway.

TO FIGURE UMPQUA IRRIGATION NEEDS

MEDFORD, April 5.—(AP)—County watermasters, irrigation district managers, California Oregon Power company employees and federal reclamation allies met here today to make the annual estimate on the irrigation water outlook for the coming season for Klamath basin, the Umpqua valley, the Illinois and Applegate river districts and the Rogue river valley.

Douglas, Klamath, Josephine and Jackson counties are represented at the session.

Federal Irrigation Engineer Arch Work said the report would be made public by mid-week.
