TOMATO CATSUP

MRS. ALBERT LONG, Roseburg.
1 gal. ripe tomatoes; 2 med. size onions sliced; 1 c. red peppers, seeded and chopped. Combine and cook without adding water until soft. Put mixture through a strainer and measure the pulp. To 1 gal. pulp add the following: 2 T. salt; 4 T. sugar; 2 T. celery seed; 1 T. ground mustard; 1 T. vinegar; 1 T. whole allspice; 1 T. stick cinnamon; 1 T. whole cloves; 1 T. paprika. Tie whole spices loosely in a bag during cooking and remove bag before bottling in jars. Cook all ingredients except vinegar rapidly for 30 min., add vinegar and cook until mixture is thick. Seal in clean hot jars.

Variations
Omit onions and red peppers. 1/4 gal. recipe. 2 T. vinegar.—Mrs. J. F. Rose, Roseburg.

Instead of red peppers use 1/4 c. cayenne pepper and 4 garlic cloves to gal. tomato pulp and 1 c. vinegar.—Mrs. Hazel Walker, Roseburg.

To each gal. cooked tomato pulp add 12 T. cider vinegar; 1 T. sugar. Boil together all ingredients 15 min. Seal.—Mrs. Reuben Fullerton, Roseburg.
