

BOWLES' DAMAGE CASE REMANDED

Decision Here Favorable to Defendants Meets With Reversal.

Decisions of Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly in the damage suit of Bradford T. Bowles against Leona Creason, Sheriff Percy Webb, Deputy Sheriff Clifford Thornton and State Policeman Fred Perry were reversed in a written opinion announced today by the supreme court at Salem, according to word received here.

The reversal held with the plaintiff and remanded the case for further proceedings.

The original suit was brought by Bowles against Mrs. Creason and the officers, following an argument over possession of a team of horses.

The complaint stated that when Mrs. Creason, with the officers, went to the Bowles place to claim the team, that Bowles had mistreated her. Thornton placed Bowles under arrest and took him to jail, where he was released on bond. The grand jury later failed to indict him and the case was dismissed.

After the jury report, Bowles charged false arrest and imprisonment and asked for damages. The case was heard by a jury which found for the defendants. Bowles appealed citing 20 cases of alleged error on the part of the court in the matter of evidence, instructions to the jury and other such matters.

Justice Campbell, in the court's written opinion, stressed the unnecessary delay in taking an accused before a magistrate.

S. P. STRIKE RESTS ON F. R.'S ACTION

SAN FRANCISCO, April 13.—(AP)—Twenty-five members of a strike committee gathered today to issue directions for a walkout of 5,000 Southern Pacific employees, which strike leaders said would be called out unless President Franklin D. Roosevelt intervenes.

Presidential intervention would mean appointment of a federal emergency board to mediate between the employees, represented by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen. Southern Pacific company officials have expressed the opinion that machinery set up in the railroad mediation act would prevent a walkout.

KILLED FATHER FOR BEATINGS, SON SAYS

OROVILLE, Calif., April 13.—(AP)—M. R. Bryant, 49, railroad brakeman, was found dead Monday, and Sheriff Alvin Klatzer reported the arrest of William Bryant, 21, his son.

The sheriff quoted young Bryant as admitting he killed his father by striking him over the head with a pickaxe handle. The killing, Klatzer reported, occurred at 3 a. m. Monday at Bryant's house.

"Father had beaten me several times when he was drunk," Sheriff Klatzer said young Bryant told him. "He had beaten mother many times."

ROGUE'S ANGLERS WARNED TO FIGHT

LAKESIDE, April 12.—(AP)—Sportsmen must show more aggressiveness in protecting the Rogue river or they will find Gold Beach a "bunch of shucks" and the stream "plugged with mud, suckers and catfish." Representative Roy Carter of Coos and Curry counties told the Coos Bay chapter of the Izak Walton League Saturday.

Carter said support for the anti-pollution bill before the legislature "seems dead" because sportsmen failed to make a serious effort to offset upriver mining interests.

"Those fellows were lined up seven deep to kill it," he added. He described the fight to close the famous waters to commercial fishing but pointed out that the people of Gold Beach are "now faced with a more serious situation that bids fair to set its stride back to inertia."

"We must fight or we shall be wiped out," he said.

Prominent sportsmen and officials from many sections of the state attended the event. M. T. Hoy, state fish warden, said Japanese activities in the North Pacific menaced the country's salmon industry. Representative Earl Hill urged greater public interest in conserving game resources.

Frank Wire, state game superintendent, discussed commission affairs and commended Representative Carter.

Action against destruction of small game fish by shags, mergansers, kingfishers and snakes was recommended by R. P. Hovenden of the Siuslaw roda and gun club. Captain J. W. Morris spoke for the newly organized Ducks Unlimited.

BIG CROWD LOOMS FOR BAND CARNIVAL

The school band music carnival, scheduled for Friday night at Senior high school auditorium, promises to draw a large crowd, judging from the success of the advance ticket sale, it was reported today. Upon the success of the entertainment, it is announced, depends the band's participation this year in the Portland Rose festival, as the program, so far as is now known, will be the only event the band will sponsor to finance the cost of its trip.

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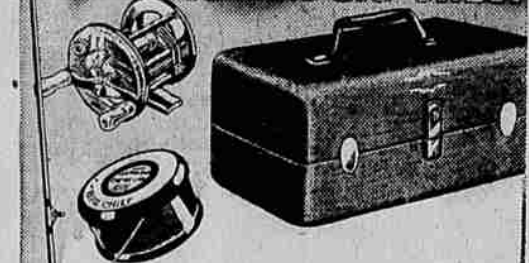

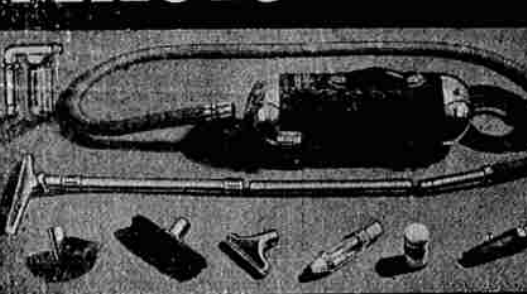
