Satin-Striped Chiffon Will Make It WEDDING A LA MODE



New and picturesque, as romantic as the wedding itself, is the lovely bridal gown of white satin-striped chiffon over tulle. Notice that the fabric is cut to make the stripes create a bias effect, and that the bridal cap is heart-shaped to harmonize with the décolleté of the gown. The dress for the maid-of-honor (left) is of white starched chiffon with lime green satin stripes. It is cut on the same lines as the wedding gown. Incidentally, it would make a lovely summer dance frock.

NEW YORK—Pictureque is the word to describe wedding gowns the smartest brides are buying. They'll walk down the aisle in pure white gown which mold the waist and drape about knees and ankles. Princess and Empire lines predominate. Satin-striped chiffon, mousseline and traditional bridal satin are the favored fabrics, with net over satin, lace and starched organza quite important, too.

You can, if you choose, be married in a pale pastel gown or even a brighter colored one. However, since bridal costume silhouettes are so thrillingly dramatic, important designers agree that pure white is the most suitable and flattering medium. The procession to the altar takes its color from the dresses of the attendants.

Leonora Ormsby, trousseau expert, suggests a bridal gown of white starched chiffon with graduated satin stripes over white tulle. Eight rows, cut so the satin stripes form a bias effect, mold the bodice and waistline and are 12 yards wide on the floor. There are a train, heart-shaped décolleté, and long, tight sleeves, slightly exaggerated at the shoulders. The bridal cap, to which the tulle veil is attached, has a heart-shaped point at the front.

For the maids' gowns, Miss Ormsby recommends matching fabric with the satin stripes in various bright shades. The maid-of-honor gets white starched chiffon with graduated lime green stripes. The maids' gowns are striped in bright pink, French blue, peach, yellow and so on.

Flowers for the bride and her attendants are chosen as carefully as gowns and accessories. The type of blossoms, colors and method of arrangement make or break the finished picture. And every

bride should think of her procession and the group around the altar as a painting, with every detail perfect.

Another lovely wedding gown, also in the Leonora Ormsby collection, is of white mousseline de soie with low neckline, puff sleeves, voluminous skirt, tiny buttons down the front. It is trimmed at neckline and décolleté with 60 yards of hand-rolled ruffling. Miss Ormsby dresses in this group are in pastel tones of matching material, with plain necklines and ruffling around the necks. The bride carries a sheath of white butterfly orchids, the attendants small sheafs of spring blossoms in light colors.

Among the lovely sheath-like gowns, minus exaggerated fullness at necklines, is a quiet, long-sleeved model with a front flounce which ends in a train. It comes in creamy satin and is worn with a hip-length veil.
