PEANUT LOAF

MRS. PHILIP KELLEY, Roseburg. To 1 cup of bread crumbs add 1 cup of ground peanuts, one tablespoon frying fat or butter, 1 cup cold mashed potatoes, 2 well-beaten eggs, 1 cup sweet milk, and seasoning of salt, pepper, sugar. Form into a loaf and bake in a moderate oven 30 min. Just before serving cover with highly seasoned dressing of tomato sauce.

PEANUT BUTTER LOAF

MRS. J. A. YOUNG, Dillard. 1 c peanut butter cream; 2 c cooked rice; 2 eggs; 1 T. chopped onion; 1/2 c small onion; celery salt and salt to taste. Thin peanut butter to consistency of heavy cream with hot water to make 1 cup. Add rice, beaten eggs and seasonings. Bake in moderate oven 30 min. or until brown. Serve with tomato sauce.

RICE-LENTIL ROAST

MRS. J. A. YOUNG, Dillard. 2 c steamed rice; 2 c cooked lentils; 1 c tomato juice; 2 eggs; 1/2 c peanut butter; 1 medium onion, minced; salt and sage to taste; 1/2 c chopped walnuts. Cream peanut butter in tomato juice. Mix all ingredients. Bake in oiled baking dish. Serve with cranberry sauce or tomato gravy.

SPINACH LOAF

MRS. L. R. NICHOLS, Brockway. MRS. J. H. SHORT, Roseburg. 1 lb. spinach put through food chopper, a little onion, 1 lb cottage cheese, 5 eggs, 4 slices bread softened in hot milk, pepper and salt to taste. Make in loaf. Bake in buttered dish, slowly. Serve with tomato sauce or plain.

CANDIED SWEET POTATOES

MRS. L. R. NICHOLS, Brockway. MRS. ROBERT HIRPS, Dillard. MRS. FRED CHAMBERLAIN, Roseburg, Ore. MRS. JOE KUNISIE, Roseburg. Wash potatoes, cover with boiling salted water and cook until tender. Drain, pare and cut into thin slices about 1/2 in. thick. Place in a greased pan. Sprinkle generously with brown sugar and a little Karo syrup. Pour melted butter over surface and bake in a moderate oven until potatoes are well glazed.
