GOLF CUP TOURNEY TO START SUNDAY

The President's Cup tournament will be started at the Roseburg Country club Sunday, April 25, and will continue through four consecutive Sundays, 18 holes being played each Sunday. It was announced today by Ward Cummings, tournament chairman. Play will begin promptly at 9:00 a. m. While this is strictly a medal score tournament with the cup going to the holder of the low score for the 72 holes, there will be special prizes awarded at the end of each 18 holes.

The course is fast drying out and will be in fine shape for the tee off by Sunday. Cummings reports. On May 16 the regular inter-club tournaments will begin with Cottage Grove as guests. That also being the last Sunday of the President's Cup tournament, those playing in the team competition will include their scores in the cup tournament.

There is an unusual amount of interest being shown this year and it is the hope of the committee that a real turnout will be had for these events, Cummings said. It is the plan of the committee to hold many interesting club tournaments throughout the playing season, blind bogeys, derbies and what not, something of interest each Sunday for everyone.

WELL PROVIDES FARMER WITH FUEL AND WATER

ALVA, Okla., April 19.--Clarence Annis, farmer, has a double action well. He asserts it provides him with both water and motor fuel. Annis says he pumps the fluid from the ground through one pipe then lets it settle. Within a few hours the gasoline comes to the top, a yellow liquid, and Annis skims it off with a bucket. He sells about 100 gallons of this fuel daily, paying the regular gasoline tax, and also uses the fuel in his car and tractor. After taking off the fuel he uses the water for his stock.
