ROASTED POTATO WITH DRESSING

MRS. E. B. ESTELLE, Roseburg. Cook medium size pared potatoes in a saucepan until about half done. Drain and lay in an oiled baking pan. Sprinkle with salt, then with flour, and brush over each potato with an oiled brush. Put into a quick oven and bake until partly cooked; then fill in between the potatoes with dressing, and finish baking together. Serve with brown gravy.

POTATO CAKES

DONNA BROWN KERNIN, Roseburg, Ore. 6 medium potatoes; 1 c hot milk; 2 eggs, well beaten; 1 onion. Peel and grate the potatoes and permit the liquor to drain off. Allow it to rest over night or until the starch of some has been formed. Pour the water off, add boiling milk, stirring slowly, while adding to water you just poured off. Add this dark milky solution to the grated potatoes, stirring all the time. Add eggs well beaten, grated onion and salt to taste. Fry to a golden brown in a pan in hot fat. Omit the onion if preferred. Air turns the potatoes dark, making the cakes a novelty. This recipe was very popular in the '90s.
