**GLAZED ONIONS**

Boil 10 medium onions in salt water for 20 min. Mix together 1/4 c sugar and 2 T melted butter. Add to drained onions. Bake in a casserole until brown.

**GOLDEN GLOW POTATOES**

Peel and split medium size potatoes. Lay split side down in thick iron frying pan. Add 2 T drippings or butter, salt and pepper to taste. 1 small c water. Cook slowly for 30 min. when the water should be evaporated, potatoes mealy and golden brown on flat side.

**SPINACH AND TOMATO / SCALLOP**

1 No. 2 1/2 can spinach; 2 eggs; 1 pt tomatoes; 2 T butter. Drain juice from spinach and tomatoes and thicken with cornstarch. Add slightly beaten eggs to spinach and tomatoes which have been combined. Put into a baking dish, cover with thickened juice and cover with bread crumbs dotted with the butter. Bake until set and browned.

**SCALLOPED ONIONS**

Peel 1 qt small onions. Cook in boiling salted water until tender. Drain, place in greased baking dish. Pour over 2 c well seasoned white sauce. Sprinkle with 1/2 lb grated cheese and 1 c fine bread crumbs mixed with 1 T or more melted butter. Bake in moderate oven just long enough to melt cheese and brown crumbs.
