

LURES NURSE TO HOME, SLAYS HER

FRESNO, Calif., May 12.—(AP)—Sheriff Overholt said today a first degree murder charge will be filed against Roy Righthouse, 27, a restaurant worker, who the sheriff said confessed he killed Mrs. Alma Estep, 35, a practical nurse, after he had lured the woman to his home.

"I did it, fellows," Overholt said Righthouse told the officers, "but I don't know why I did it."

The killing, Overholt said, took place early Tuesday morning after Righthouse summoned the nurse from an agency, struck her on the head with a pair of pliers when she entered the house, strangled her with a buckskin thong he took from the baby's crib and criminally assaulted her.

He walked into police headquarters last night and told the officers there was a dead woman in his home. Investigators discovered the body of Mrs. Estep.

Under Sheriff Jack Tarr said Righthouse admitted serving a ten day jail term for intoxication at Long Beach and had been arrested in Colorado on check charges.

The officer declared Righthouse attempted to end his life when he remained all day yesterday in his home.

"He covered himself with blankets and turned on the gas from the stove, but automatically kicked off the blankets to get fresh air,"

Tarr said, "When he decided he could not kill himself by gas, he scratched his wrists with a razor blade, but finally gave up in desperation when his nerve failed him."

HALF BRAIN GONE BUT AGAIN LEARNS

PITTSBURGH, May 12.—(AP)—A 38-year-old Pittsburgh woman with only half a brain has learned in six months to do nearly everything she once could do when she had a whole brain.

With the half brain she rates an "intelligence quotient" of 115, on the Stanford-Binet scale. This is the mark of a superior adult mind and equals her once whole mind.

Her case, due to a recent operation in which the entire right brain hemisphere was removed, was reported today to the American Psychiatric association by Dr. Stuart N. Howe of Pittsburgh.

For several weeks her left side was paralyzed. But to the amazement of physicians she now has movement on that side. She is able to walk again. Her mind and "personality" are nearly back to normal.

She does not recall events readily since the operation but remembers perfectly telephone numbers and addresses she had known.

At the beginning of her half-brain experience she joked excessively, sometimes wildly. Most of the time she was in the mood of exaggerated happiness. But she would switch to extreme despondency.

She occasionally lost control of her voice or broke into sobs. Now, six months after the operation she has regained most of her emotional control. She still becomes depressed easily and about once in 24 hours cries without any real cause.

She manages a household of six and helps her children with their school work.

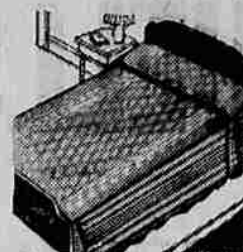
