DINTY MOORE

MRS. E. R. PETERSON, Roseburg.
1 lb. spaghetti
1 lb. sausage
1/2 lb. hamburger
3/4 cup oil
1 can corn
1 can peas
1 can mushrooms
1 qt. tomatoes
1 can pimientos
1 can ripe olives
1 large onion
1 lb. cheese
Salt and pepper to taste
Boil spaghetti until tender, drain and allow cold water to run through. Let drain. Fry meat and onions in oil. Mix all other ingredients except cheese. Place in baking dish, grate cheese over top and bake slowly from 1 to 1 1/2 hours. This dish improves each time it is heated.

BAKED LIVER IN CASSEROLE
MRS. GLENN CALLEN, Roseburg.
1 lb. liver; 2 carrots; 1 onion; 2 potatoes; 1 can peas; 6 T fat; 2 c milk; pepper and salt to taste; flour; cut potatoes and carrots in cubes. Cook till tender. Wipe liver, flour and brown in the fat, remove. Cook onions in the fat till brown. Remove them and make gravy with 3 T flour and the milk, salt and pepper. Arrange a layer of vegetables in a casserole, then liver, repeat. Pour gravy over this and bake (325°) for 1 hr.

Variation—Bubble and Squeak: Use 1 lb. round steak cut in 1 in. cubes. Brown in fat. Put layer of meat in greased casserole. Then layer of vegetables (2 c cubes potatoes; 2 sliced onions). Salt and pepper each layer. Repeat. Pour over all 1 c mock turtle soup and enough water to cover (measuring water). Cover. Cook at 350° for 2 hrs. For every cup of liquid stir in 1 T flour and cook 15 min. longer.—Mrs. E. J. Klingford, Roseburg.
