

NEW UNION DRIVE IN OREGON LOOMS

Reorganized 4-L Violates Wagner Act, Federation President Asserts.

PORTLAND, May 12.—(AP)—Asserting that the Industrial Employees' Union, Inc., the reorganized 4-L, "still violates the principles of the Wagner act," Harold Pritchett, president of the Woodworkers' Federation, said that organization would "go after" the I. E. U. membership.

He announced plans for an active campaign in the Willamette valley and the western pine area, 4-L strongholds, with four American Federation of Labor organizers taking part. Two more organizers will be in the field within 10 days, he said.

New strategy was revealed by the International Longshoremen's association in its dispute with the Coos Bay Lumber company which has closed the company's Marshfield plant, employing 700 men.

William Fischer of Portland, head of the maritime federation, said the Coos Bay local may be transferred from the Portland to the San Francisco district, to meet the company's claims that an agreement entered into with the San Francisco I. L. A. did not apply to its plant in Oregon.

The longshoremen met the company's offer to arbitrate with a counter proposal to take into its membership the six men required to hook lumber onto cranes at the company dock.

The dispute arose over the company's practice of using union sawmill workmen to load its ships at the Coos Bay plant.

Picketing of the Meier and Frank store and warehouse, here was marked by the arrest of Orville Kreps, 21, on assault and battery charges brought by Richard C. Koff, a member of the teamsters' union employed at the warehouse.

Kreps, who was released on \$100 bail, co-tenanted he did not strike the first blow, but struck Koff to "defend his spectacles."

The strike at the Willamette-Hyster plant here, in which non-union employees have applied for a court order to prevent picketing by the metal trades unions, ended with a compromise agreement, details of which were withheld.

Austin Plegler, attorney, said the company had agreed to recognize the union as bargaining agencies for their members, and that the union employees on strike since August 15 would go back to work Monday.

An active fight against speculative builders to force them to pay the union scale is planned by the building trades council, N. B. Mathis, secretary, said. He estimated the "speculators" were conducting 35 per cent of the present home building activity at present.
