STUFFED CABBAGE
MISS DORIS SANDS, Wilbur, Mrs. VICTOR E. NOEL
Roseburg, Ore.
1 med. size cabbage; 1 lb. beef; 1 slice bacon or salt pork; 1 onion; 1/4 c bread crumbs; 1/2 c milk; 1 egg (if desired); season with salt and pepper; 1 green pepper or 1 T minced parsley. Select solid head of cabbage not too large, cut out stalk and leaving hollow shell. Chop uncooked beef with bacon and onion, add crumbs soaked in milk, beaten eggs, salt and pepper. Shape mixture into ball or cakes; arrange in cabbage. Place strips of sweet pepper on top of cabbage. Tie in cheese cloth, then steam or boil until tender. Serve with tomato sauce or brown gravy.
