ITALIAN SPAGHETTI

S. CASEY, Roseburg.
2 lbs. spaghetti; 3 cans tomatoes; 2 cans mushrooms; 2 pkgs. Parmesan cheese. Cook onions, sliced, in olive oil with a little garlic; fry until well cooked but not brown. Strain tomatoes, add cooked spaghetti, Parmesan cheese and mushrooms and then add onions with a little green pepper chopped fine. Season and bake about 40

LIMA BEAN PATTIES

MRS. V. BEGG, Roseburg.
2 c cooked lima beans; 1 T chopped onion; 1 c of grated American cheese; 1 T melted butter; 1 T flour; salt, pepper; 2 eggs; fine cracker crumbs. Drain all liquor from beans, mash them and add chopped onion, grated cheese, butter, flour and seasonings to taste. Heat in a skillet over a low flame, stirring constantly. Add bacon, egg yolks and cook slowly for five min. When cool, form into patties and dip them into the slightly beaten egg whites. Roll in cracker crumbs and fry on both sides until brown. Garnish the platter with

parsley and serve the patties with broiled bacon.

LIMA BEAN SCALLOP

MRS. H. P. CONN, Roseburg.
2 1/4 c cooked lima beans; dry bread crumbs; 1 T flour; 4 T shortening; 1/2 t salt; 1/2 t pepper; 1 c grated cheese; 2 c milk. To make the cheese sauce: Melt shortening, stir in the flour, then the milk, salt and pepper. Cook until thick and then add cheese. Heat until cheese is melted. Put a layer of lima beans in a greased baking dish. Cover with sauce, then with bread crumbs which have been sautéed in fat until brown. Repeat, leaving the crumbs on top. Bake for 20 or 30 min. in moderate oven, 375° F. Serves six.

MIDNIGHT OMELET

MRS. C. R. REIBLING
4 slices bacon
2 tablespoons chopped onion
3-oz. can mushrooms
6 eggs
1/2 cup milk or cream
Salt, pepper
Chop bacon fine and cook with chopped onion in frying pan until slightly browned. Cut mushrooms into quarters or slices and cook with bacon and onion about 5 min. Beat eggs slightly with a fork, add milk or cream and season with salt and pepper. Add to mushroom mixture and cook slowly until eggs are set, but not too firm. Turn out on plates and garnish with very thin slices of toast cut in fancy shapes.

PINEAPPLE FRITTERS

MRS. THURMAN SMITH
Roseburg, Ore.
1 c flour; 2 eggs; 1/2 t salt; 1 T butter; 1/2 c milk; small can crushed pineapple. Sift flour and salt together. Add milk gradually. Beat in egg yolks. Add melted butter. Add the egg whites, beaten stiff. Add crushed pineapple, saving juice for sauce for fritters. Fry in deep hot fat. Sauce: 1 T flour; 2 T sugar; lump butter and pineapple juice. Cook till clear. Serve hot with the fritters.
