BANANA CORN FRITTERS

DORIS SHORTIDGE, Roseburg. MRS. CHAS. SOLOMON, Umpqua, Ore.

3 eggs, 1 cup sweet milk, 2 t. baking powder, salt and flour. Drop from spoon. Fry in deep fat. To this mixture may be added a cup of canned corn or a cup of ripe bananas.

SCOTCH EGGS

MRS. B. A. MELLIS, Roseburg.

Measure 2 cups of milk into a double boiler. Break 2 eggs and drop into the milk. Add 1 teaspoon of salt and beat all with a whip or beater until thoroughly mixed. Cook 15 to 20 minutes over boiling water till the custard is set. Serve on squares on buttered toast. Chopped boiled ham may be added for variety.
