PRIZE WINNER WHITE AND CHOCOLATE CAKE

(2 Cakes)
MRS. E. R. FENN, Roseburg.
White cake: 1/2 cup butter or other shortening, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup milk, 3 cups flour, 3 t. baking powder, 1 t. flavoring, 7 egg whites. Cream thoroughly butter and sugar. Sift flour and baking powder three times and add alternately with milk to creamed mixture; add flavoring and fold in well beaten egg whites. Bake in layers in moderate oven. Use any food coloring if desired.
Chocolate cake is made the same as white cake, using egg yolks in place of whites and adding 2 or 3 t. grated chocolate or cocoa.

I really think this is a tested recipe as it has been my standby for about 35 years. I mix my own and my daughter's wedding cakes by it and many birthday cakes including my granddaughter's. It also took first prize at a fair the only time I entered it.

WHITE CAKE

MRS. DELAINE STRADER, Roseburg, Ore.
MRS. GEORGE STALEY, Roseburg, Ore.
Cream well: 1/2 cup shortening, 1 cup sifted sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Sift together: 3 cups sifted pastry flour, 3 t. baking powder, 2 t. salt.

Add alternately to creamed mixture: 1 cup sweet milk, 1/2 cup sweet milk. Fold in: 2 egg whites stiffly beaten; Bake 20 minutes.

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GEORGIA VOTES ON DRY LAW REPEAL

ATLANTA, June 8.—(AP)—Georgia voted today on 26 constitutional amendments and repeal of the state's 22-year-old prohibition law, closing an off-year political battle between Governor E. D. Rivers and former Governor Eugene Tamm.

Tamm urged defeat of the "new deal" amendments and retention of the prohibition law. Rivers urged the state on behalf of the amendments voted to his Rooseveltian program in Georgia, but retained aloof from the repeal question.

Georgia's dry law was upheld in 1925 by a majority of about 200 votes.

Leading the list of amendments on the ballot were two which depended on a pending action on Governor Rivers' social security program. They would give the state and counties power to levy taxes for paying old age pensions.

AMERICA FLIES TO EASIER TAKEOFF SPOT

DAKAR, French Senegal, June 8.—(AP)—Amelia Earhart flew here today from St. Louis, capital of Senegal, for an easier takeoff on the next leg of her flight across the world.

Aviators here said Miss Earhart's start of 13 hours and 22 minutes for the 1,300 miles from Natal, Brazil, to Saint Louis, Senegal, where she landed yesterday, apparently was a record for the eastward South Atlantic crossing. The westward mark of 12 hours and 5 minutes also is held by a woman, Maryse Bastie.

Miss Earhart flew through rain most of the way across the ocean, she said. The visibility at nightfall was bad and her wireless worked poorly.

The American flyer, after her arrival here from the Senegalese capital, held up her plane for repairs. She said it would be tomorrow or Thursday before she could hop off across Africa.

She plans to follow the British route to Chartom, in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, to avoid flying across the Sahara.
