

SECURITY SERVICE CHANGE ANNOUNCED

Federal Board, Instead of Post Office, to Issue Workers' Numbers.

Southwestern Oregon employees in commerce, industry and professional service covered by the federal old age benefit system of the social security act will be issued social security account numbers through the Eugene office of the social security board after June 30, according to an announcement by Laurence E. Fischer, Eugene manager of the social security board.

"The present arrangement between the board and the post office department, in which the latter accepts applications for social security accounts and issues the numbers, expires at the end of the month," Mr. Fischer said. "Thereafter the social security board will handle this work through its field offices except that the post office in cities where the board does not have an office will continue their cooperation on a limited basis by maintaining a supply of application forms (SS-5) for the convenience of local employers and employees."

Fischer stated that arrangements have been practically completed for taking over the handling of applications for social security accounts and the making of a permanent record of the information which the federal government requires in connection with its old age benefit system. The Eugene office will issue account numbers to employees in the Douglas, Coos, Curry and Josephine counties.

Employees Urged to File. It was also urged that all employees working in occupations covered by the social security act file applications for social security accounts with their local post offices at once if they have not done so. He emphasized that a social security account is essential to setting up a record of the employee's wages upon which monthly retirement benefits at age 65 are computed. Also, that it simplifies the employer's task when he hires new employees.

By June 30 every employer in industry, commerce or professional service must have the social security account number of each employee worked for him since January 1. This information is required in connection with a report to be filed with the collector of internal revenues in July. If an employer fails to obtain a number, the employee must file an application for an account number on the employer's behalf, according to treasury department regulations.

PROSPECTS BRIGHT FOR U. S. FARMERS

Large Crops Foreseen and Legislation Promises Benefit Payments.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—Government farm leaders fore-saw bright prospects today for a bountiful 1937 harvest—both in the fields and in congress.

Agriculture department market experts said that probable large crops of wheat, rice, corn, oats and other grains would cause a downward adjustment in prices to the farmer, but that greater volume would offset lower prices and increase total cash income.

Farm cash income in the first four months of this year amounted to \$2,531,000,000, a gain of \$511,000,000 over the same 1936 period.

Government economists said the 1937 12-month total is approaching \$9,000,000,000. This would surpass the \$7,865,000,000 total last year, highest since the depression. The 1929 peak was \$10,479,000,000.

Part of last year's gain came from drought forced early marketing of livestock. The economists said smaller marketings of cattle and pigs the rest of this year would be offset by higher prices.

President Roosevelt already has signed an act which expanded the scope of federal marketing plans for farm products. Agriculture department officials said this should increase income of many farmers.

The house and senate have assured farmers that federal benefit payments under the soil conservation act will continue with at least \$40,000,000 available.

Still some farm spokesmen have expressed disappointment that congressional leaders have deferred until 1938 broad legislation to stabilize agricultural prices.

Edward A. O'Neil, president of the American Farm Bureau federation, said farmers "have just begun to fight" for its enactment this year.

Bumper crops this year will increase the need for the program, O'Neil said.

Secretary Wallace said federal tenancy and crop insurance measures appeared assured of approval at this session. He added that the tenancy program would provide from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000 and the insurance program \$21,000,000.

**SCOTTISH FLIERS
KILLED IN CRASH**

BEAUVAIS, France, June 21.—(AP)—The Hon. Thomas Sharon Fernor-Hesketh, 26, and Lieut. Ludford Astley, 22, were killed today when their airplane crashed near the village of Martin.

Hesketh, the heir of Lord Hesketh, was a member of the House of Commons.

The two men, both officers in the second battalion of Scots guards, were on a flying tour of France.

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**MAPLE RETURNS
TO WILLAMETTE**

CORVALLIS, June 21.—(AP)—Howard Maple, coach of freshman sports here the past year, announced today his return to Willamette university as head coach of basketball and baseball and assistant to Roy S. "Spec" Keene in football.

Maple, who previously was an assistant football coach at Willamette, will report to his new post July 1. His salary was not announced. Keene, he reported, will devote full time to football and athletic duties as director of athletics at Willamette.

Successor to Maple as freshman mentor at Oregon State college probably will be withheld until the next meeting of the intercollegiate athletic board.

**CATHOLIC PUPILS
OBEY NAZI EDICT**

MUNICH, Germany, June 21.—(AP)—Hundreds of thousands of Catholic school children quit their parochial schools all over predominantly Catholic Bavaria today in obedience to a Nazi government order which dissolved the schools and made them secular institutions.

In Munich and upper Bavaria alone, the decree converted 966 parochial schools into secular institutions. Only 100 secular schools had existed heretofore in this area.

Authorities insisted they closed the Catholic schools "with the parents' consent."

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**FRUIT GROWERS HIT
CHAIN STORE TAX**

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—Pacific northwest congressmen said today fruit growers in their states are protesting against enactment of a District of Columbia chain store tax because "it will be an open invitation to states to attempt the same legislation."

Senators Steiwer and McNary of Oregon and Bone and McNary of Washington said they had received "large number of telegrams" protesting the proposed tax.

**RAILWAY PENSION
BILL PASSES HOUSE**

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—The house passed without opposition today the Wagner-Crosser bill to establish a government-supervised pension system for the nation's railroad workers.

It now goes to the senate. Designed to replace the existing railroad retirement act now under railroad court attack, the bill would provide:

Voluntary retirement privilege at 65 at a monthly pension up to \$120.

Privilege of retiring at 60, provided applicant has 30 years service, with pension deduction of one-fifteenth for each year under 65.

Pensions for workers 60 or over who are totally and permanently disabled.

Death benefits.

Private railroad pension rolls would be taken over and added to the national, government-supervised roll.

Pensions would be paid from taxes levied equally on the employee and the railroad. Speaker Harkness announced the standing vote as 349 to 0.

**ABDICATION CRISIS
TACT WINS BIG SUM**

LONDON, June 21.—(AP)—An anonymous donor has given £250,000 (\$1,250,000) to the empire as a tribute to the way Stanley Baldwin handled the abdication crisis. It was disclosed in commons lobbies today.

The donor said he wanted to

make a "thanks offering" for the former prime minister's "courageous, far-seeing and sympathetic handling of a supremely difficult situation, which averted incalculable dangers for the empire."

The money was placed at the disposal of the premier's office for the purpose of "endowing any object best calculated to strengthen still further" the ties that bind the empire.

Independent trustees will administer the money as an imperial trust.
