- APPLESAUCE CAKE Mrs. ALFRED STEPHENS Roseburg, Ore. MRS. ESTELLE GARRISON Roseburg, Ore. MRS. ELMER ESTELLE Myrtle Creek, Ore. ALICE BRADLEY, Roseburg. 1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup sugar (white or brown) 1 egg 1 1/2 cups (unsweetened) apple sauce 2 cups cake flour 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 tablespoon cornstarch 3 tablespoons cocoa 1 teaspoon soda 1 teaspoon allspice 1/2 teaspoon cloves 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 cup chopped raisins 1/2 cup chopped nuts Cream butter, add sugar, beat until light, add well-beaten eggs and apple sauce. Sift flour with all other dry ingredients and add, then mix in the chopped raisins and nuts. Pour into greased cake loaf pan. Bake about 25 or 40 min. at about 400° F.
