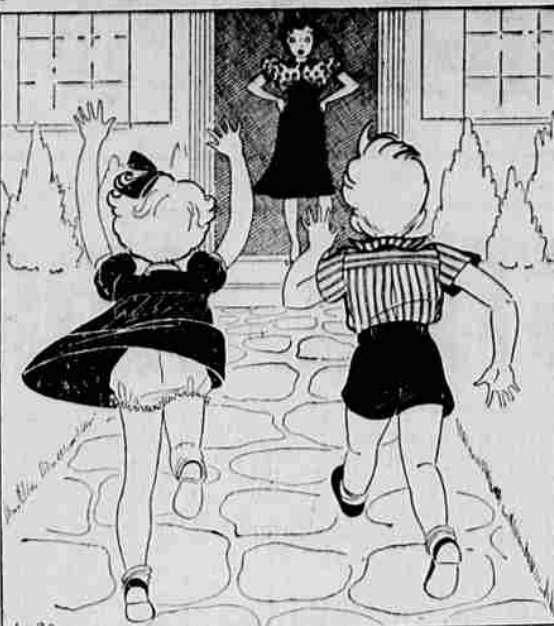

OREGON EARNINGS IN NYA SHOWN

PORTLAND, June 30.—(AP)—Karl W. Onthank, director of the national youth administration in Oregon, said that 5,127 high school, college and graduate students in the state earned a total of \$204,191 through participation in the 1936-37 NYA program.

Earnings of 2,951 students in 200 high schools through part time employment averaged \$4 a month for nine months. The 2,166 college and graduate students in 23 institutions of higher learning averaged \$11.13 a month.

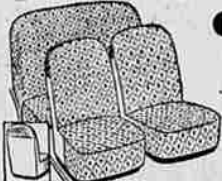

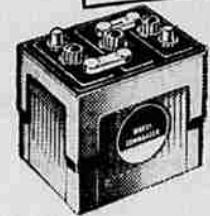
