SCOUT JAMBOREE OPENS AT CAPITOL

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—A booming cannon at the base of the Washington monument heralded the start today of one of the nation's largest youth demonstrations—the boy scout jamboree.

Upwards of 25,000 scouts were massed in khaki columns through 350 green acres of historic ground for the brief ceremonies.

The first shot, echoing from Capitol Hill to the grassy Arlington slopes, was a signal for the boys and their leaders to spring to salute before the colors of their country.

Eleven minutes later another blast was ordered, preceding the unfurling of 52 foreign standards along the state avenue of flags.

The deep boom of the final cannon four minutes later was the cue for a simultaneous display of 1613 other flags through the camp city.

The remainder of the first day held this program for the thousands who came to Washington afoot, by bicycle, motorcycle, automobile, train, bus, boat and airplane.

Excursions to Mount Vernon. Performances in camp theatres. Uncle Dan Beard, venerable scout pioneer, will light this evening with flint and steel the fire of fellowship which will burn during the encampment.

Word spread through the camp that President Roosevelt—who is scheduled to ride through the trooped ranks along Constitution avenue next week—might pay an unexpected visit to the tents.

While this remained in doubt, one thing became certain—the white house can't hold the 2,500 gifts which the boys have brought Mr. Roosevelt.

A hurried inventory of the presents showed: Horned toads, shark teeth, armadillos, mounted birds, colored sponges, totem poles, Indian wampum, gold from Cripple creek, miniature cotton bales, pine cones and—a singing mouse.

DOG SAVES YOUTH FROM RATTLESNAKE

TOKYO, June 30.—(AP)—Women workers in the pig iron department of the Fukuoka Iron Works, alarmed on the grounds that their husbands were employed in the same plant, announced today they would get divorces in order to regain their jobs.

"We have husbands, but we are independent workers," the leaders of the militant women workers declared. "We will fight for reinstatement even if we must lose our husbands."

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YOUNG PEOPLE HOLD ANNUAL CONCLAVE

GLENDAL, June 30.—Fifty young people—37 girls and 12 boys—are in attendance at the Presbyterian Young People's conference being held at Fir Point, near Glendale. Conference delegates and visitors are from Medford, Jacksonville, Grants Pass, Oakland, Roseburg, Hood River, Ashland, Malin, Phoenix and Merrill, Oregon; Tule Lake, Calif. and Yuma, Ariz.

Rev. Forrest Traville is dean of the conference, with Mrs. W. M. Campbell of Roseburg, serving as dean of girls. Miss Lucille Swoesy, of Hamadan, Persia, is in charge of the missions school.

This year's conference is the fourth annual meeting at Fir Point, donated by Rev. and Mrs. J. K. Howard as a permanent camp site.

The camp is situated atop a timbered hill. There are three large buildings, made entirely of logs, taken from the nearby property and all finished in rustic. Howard hall, the main building, houses the large dining room, kitchen and registration office. Alta hall is the girls' dormitory. It is divided in half and each half is lined on three sides with two tiers of bunks. Ingaham hall, the dormitory for boys, is constructed in the same fashion.

In addition to the buildings, there are courts for tennis, softball and baseball, and a large, concrete swimming tank.

NAVAL AIR FLEET HEADS FOR SEATTLE

SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 1.—(AP)—Twenty-four navy patrol planes took off at 7 a. m. today on a 1500-mile flight to Seattle.

Aboard were 35 officers and 120 enlisted men, commanded by Lieutenant Commander Robert L. Fuller.

The planes will operate in the Puget sound area until mid-August. It is understood.

Twelve of the same type planes flew non-stop from here to Panama—3000 miles—last week in approximately 27 hours. It was expected that today's flight would require about 12 hours.

BILL ABOLISHING MAIL BIDS VETOED

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, declaring the competitive bidding system is "fundamentally sound," vetoed today a bill which would have permitted the postmaster general to renew "star route" mail contracts without asking for bids.

Star routes serve communities not on regular train and steamship lines.
