SWEET PICKLES

MRS. NICK ANDRAFF
Roseburg, Ore.
MRS. MARVIA KNIGGE, Roseburg, Ore., said and placed 2 gal. of cucumbers in a stone jar. Pour over them 2 c salt in 1 gal. of boiling water. Let stand 1 week. Skim. If necessary, 8th day drain. Pour over them 1 gal. of boiling water with 1 t alum. Let stand 24 hrs. 8th day drain. Pour over them 1 gal. fresh boiling water. 10th day drain. Pour over them boiling hot 5 pts. strong vinegar, 6 c sugar, 1 t celery seeds and 5 sticks of cinnamon. Each day for 3 days drain off this liquid, reheat and add 1 c of sugar. Pour this over the pickles. Store in a covered jar.
