SWEET PICKLES

MRS. ROY CATCHING, Roseburg.
Wash. cucumbers and place in jars. To every gal. of water use 1 c. salt. Let stand in brine 7 days. Pour off brine and cover with boiling water. Let stand 24 hrs. and drain. Take 1 T of powdered alum for each gal. boiling water. Split cucumbers almost to stem or cut into chunks, then pour the boiling alum water over them and let stand 24 hrs. Drain, and put boiling water over again and let stand 24 hrs. Drain. 3 qts vinegar; 4 c. sugar; pickling spices. Heat all together and pour over pickles. Let stand 24 hrs. Pour off vinegar and add 1 c. sugar. Bring to boil and pour over pickles. Do this for 3 mornings, adding 1 c. sugar each morning. Seal or not.

SWEET PICKLES

MRS. HARRY GRIMM, Roseburg.
MRS. T. W. SEIGEL, Camas Valley, Ore.

MRS. FRED BOWEN, Roseburg.
Fill a 5-gal. keg or crock to within 2 in. of top with cucumbers. Fill with brine, using 2 lbs. salt and 2 1/2 gal. of cold water. Let stand 10 days. Rinse pickles in cold water and put back in keg and cover with 2 1/2 gal. vinegar and 3/4 oz. alum and let stand 10 days. Pour vinegar off and stick each pickle with a fork. Replace in jar and cover with sweet vinegar made as follows: using the same vinegar; 1 1/2 gal. vinegar; 15 lbs. sugar; 4 T pickling spices. Mix and bring to a boil. Cool. Add 1 oz. benzene of soda in about 1/2 c. warm water. Add to vinegar and pour over pickles. Ready to use in a few days.

LAZY WIFE PICKLES

MRS. W. L. ROSE, Roseburg.
1 gal. vinegar; 1 c. salt; 1 c. sugar; 1 c. dry mustard. Pack cucumbers in jars. Pour mixture over. Screw on lids. Use after 2 weeks.

FATHER OF FORWARD PASS DIES AT 69

ANNAPOLIS, Md., July 1.—(AP)—The "father" of football's forward pass—Capt. Paul N. Dashiell, U. S. N., retired, is dead. The former player, professor, coach, umpire and rules committee chairman died yesterday of a heart attack at the navy hospital, where he was undergoing eye treatments. He was 69.

Captain Dashiell suggested the "revolutionary" forward pass in 1905. He was one of a group who drew up uniform rules in 1896 and headed the national rules committee formed then, until 1911.
