Following an open date last Sunday on which most Southern Oregon league ball clubs played exhibition affairs with other league members, the teams will square off next Sunday for the first game of the final half of the 15-game split season schedule. Five greatly strengthened outfits will point all their guns at the Crescent City Merchants, runaway winners of the first half race, and fans are figuring it will be one of the tightest stretch battles in many years. The second half consists of seven games.

With a new lease on life because of the split season, Ashland's Lithians will entertain the first-half champions in one of the three opening shots of the second-half. Southport Bob Hardy, University of Oregon hurler, will be on the mound for Ashland with McLean back of the plate. Montgomery, slugging outfielder who saw little action the first-half, is expected to be back at his right field post for the Lithians. Koll, league-leading pitcher with four wins and no losses, will probably do the Crescent City pitching to Mallinverno. Koll is also a southpaw, and with Hardy is rated the class of the circuit.

Grants Pass Improves
At Medford, the improving Grants will tangle with Manager Ted Pernell's Grants Pass Merchants, also loaded with the gunnells with new player talent. Pepper, curve-baller deluxe, will do the Medford pitching, with Balkovick wearing the big mitt. Rudy Heyne, property of the St. Louis Browns from Crockett, Calif., will hurl for Grants Pass and Hartmann will catch. Heyne is a right-hander. Boasting the best first hitting team in the league, Grants Pass now figures to challenge seriously for the championship of all and sundry, now that needed pitching help has been acquired.

The Glendale Loggers, celebrities the first-half, will travel to Roseburg with eyes only for the future. Manager Jake Gipe left for California recently, and the Loggers are now being managed by Floyd Claire. Larry Nuunen, Kamp, Willamette university star right-hander, or Carpenter will do the Glendale twirling to Plaster back of the plate. At Roseburg, Barr will probably open on the mound, with Goff taking care of the catching duty.

Past Scores Close
Testifying to the even distribution of player strength in the league, despite Crescent City's apparent ease in winning the first-half pennant, is the fact that of the 23 games played in that block, 11 were won by only two or less tallies, and six of them were decided by the lone one-run margin. The champions grabbed three victories by two counters, one by a lone tally, and one by a three-run margin. Two battles were won by five-run spreads.

Frammed Tops Hitters
Orville Frammed, the Crescent City outfielding flash, made a runaway race of the first-half league batting battle by clouting out 11 hits in 21 trips to the plate for an average of .524. The brilliant youngster at the first-half championships also crossed the plate nine times to lead all others in the runs-scored department.

Baker, Roseburg; McLean, Ashland, and Ostrom and McCarthy of Grants Pass finished the first-half with batting marks of .400 or over. McCarthy was the lone league player to connect safely in every game, all others failing at least once.

Boasting a mark of .297, the second-place Grants Pass Merchants finished with the highest team batting average. The Crescent City Chinooks were a poor

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DRIVERS' LICENSES DENIED HUNDREDS

Incompetent Persons Kept
From Wheel in Effort
to Cut Deaths.

SALEM, Ore., July 7.—Approximately a quarter of a million Oregon motor vehicle operators have applied to the office of Secretary of State Snell during the past thirty days for a renewal of their drivers' licenses. It is expected that another hundred thousand applications will be received during the present month, and that all of these licenses will be in the hands of the applicants before the first of August.

Proper handling of this work constitutes a considerable problem, as well as being an important factor in safety work. The actual writing and mailing of the license cards is a comparatively small matter, but to see that they are placed only in the hands of people who are able to meet the requirements considered necessary for safe driving involves a large amount of checking and personal investigation. This constitutes a responsibility that Snell is trying to meet, and at the same time gives as prompt service as possible, he says.

Defective vision, lack of knowledge of the motor vehicle laws, inability to properly handle a car and many other reasons compel the license division to reject hundreds of applicants, in the interests of safety. Proper licensing of drivers is a heavy responsibility, but only through a strict compliance with the law is it possible for the department to do its part in helping to eliminate Oregon's traffic deaths.

SECURITY GRANTS FOR OREGON LISTED

WASHINGTON, July 8.—(AP)—The social security board said today Oregon would receive federal grants of \$537,624 for the first quarter of the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The fund will include \$101,650 for assistance to blind, \$21,231 for the aged and \$447,743 for the blind.

The estimated number of applicants for July was: Aged, 12,900; blind, 420; children, 4,000.

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COAST BATSMEN ENJOY BUSY DAY

Games Largely Swatfests,

An even 60 runs were scored in five games played. Sacramento still hung to its half game league leadership over the second place San Francisco Seals as both teams easily won their games yesterday.

Klinger limited the Seattle Indians to three hits last night as the Solons blanked them 4 to 0.

Circuit clouts by Hawkins and DiMaggio, the latter's second in as many days, helped the Seals overcome an early Los Angeles lead and win their second straight, 11 to 2. Hawkins drove in four runs and his homer came in the sixth with two on the bags and set-off a five run rally.

Oakland shared a twin bill with Portland. The Oaks won the first, 12 to 8, getting 20 safe hits which included four bangers by Holyard and Judnich. In the second game the Beavers' Cochrane slashed a homer as the Beavers measured the Acorns, 7 to 2.

Myatt, considered one of the fastest base runners in the circuit, was the sparkplug as the San Diego team beat the Missions 5 to 1. He hit two out of five and drove in three of the five runs. The Missions were held scoreless by Chaplin after nicking him for three hits and a run in the first. Bohn of the Missions was not hard, but fanned eight.

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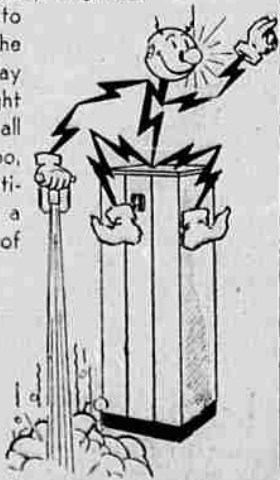
