MRS. O. W. HAHN, NATIONAL PRESIDENT, AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY



Mrs. O. W. Hahn, of Wayne, Nebraska, was elected to lead the American Legion Auxiliary's 129,000 women during the year 1936-1937 at the auxiliary's national convention in Cleveland, as the nation's president. Under her leadership the auxiliary has begun action on the broad program of civic and patriotic activities grafted at the convention.

One of the auxiliary's most prominent members for years, Mrs. Hahn was the unanimous choice of the convention delegates for the organization's highest office. Her record was so outstanding that her candidacy was unopposed.

At the time of her election Mrs. Hahn was directing the nationwide activities of the auxiliary for the welfare of disabled world war veterans as chairman of the national rehabilitation committee and was completing her sixth year in an important national post. For two years she was chairman of the national trophies, awards and emblem committee and for one year chairman of the national membership committee. She was then elected national vice-president for the northwest division, serving the year 1933-1934. In 1934 she was elected national historian and in this office directed the preparation and publishing of a history of the auxiliary which has been described by critics as the best work of its kind they have read.

Mrs. Hahn's advancement to high national offices followed years of service in local and state offices. She was a charter member and organizing president of the auxiliary unit in Clarkson, Nebraska. For three years she was president of her district and chairman of the district executive board.

The Department of Nebraska first utilized Mrs. Hahn's services as chairman of its rehabilitation committee. After a successful year in directing the work for the disabled veterans of the state, she was elected department president. She also has represented Nebraska on the national executive committee and served as chairman of the department advisory board, national defense and finance committee and the past president's party.

Mrs. Hahn was formerly a public school instructor, teaching for ten years with mathematics as her specialty. Her husband is a well known Nebraska banker. They have one son, nine years old.
