MINISTER ADMITS SLAYING WOMAN

PITTSFIELD, Ill., July 16.—(AP)—An 11:45 a. m. statement of a soft-spoken pastor that he struck his "devoted friend," Mrs. Dennis Kelly, 45, with a hammer during a roadside quarrel after she deserted her husband was claimed by authorities today.

State's Attorney Merrill Johnston of Pike county, Illinois, announced the statement and said that Rev. C. E. Newton, 51, indicated willingness to plead guilty if the grand jury indicted him. Newton, for 13 years pastor of a Baptist church at Paris, is charged with first degree murder, a crime for which the electric chair is the extreme penalty.

Johnston quoted Newton as saying Mrs. Kelly insisted he accompany her to California on her flight from home and husband which began at Paris in Newton's automobile.
